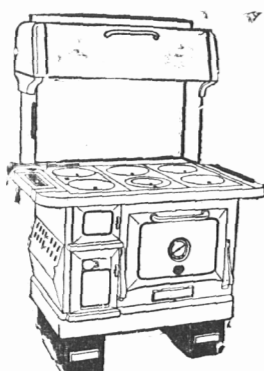

### Censorship Personell Announced

OTTAWA, Sept. 4.—(CP)— The personnel of the committee which will handle matters of censorship in Canada arising out of the war was announced tonight as follows:

John A. Sullivan, Deputy Postmaster General; Lieut.-Commander C. F. Edwards, chief of all services; Lieut. Col. R. P. Landry, Secretary, Canadian Broadcasting Corporation; Maurice La Presse, General Staff officer; L. Clare Moyer, Clerk of the Senate; Oswald Mayrand, former director, the Canadian Press, Montreal.

The announcement was made by Postmaster-General McLarty, who is chairman of the sub-committee of the cabinet on public information.

It is understood that in addition to taking part in the general directional work of the censorship committee, Mr. Moyer and Mr. Mayrand will be especially concerned with press and film censorship. Both are well known in the newspaper field. Mr. Mayrand was for 21 years editor of La Presse, Montreal, and is at present Managing Editor of the Montreal Daily Star. Mr. Moyer was for some years engaged in newspaper work in Ontario and Saskatchewan.

Mr. Sullivan will be concerned with the activities of the Post Office Department with postal censorship. He was a member of the House of Commons and is an eminent member of the French bar.

Colonel Landry and Commander Edwards will deal with questions affecting radio censorship. Mr. Edwards is a member of the House of Commons and has to do with questions of censorship on military and cable matters. Colonel Edwards is a general staff officer at the National Defence Headquarters. He served with distinction in the Great War and was awarded the Military Cross. His father, the late Sir Joseph Pope, was Sir John A. Macdonald's biographer and was successively Under Secretary of State and Under Secretary of State for External Affairs.
