Compare the present teacher's lot with the old-timer who taught 14 separate and distinct subjects, and did it without the aids provided since then by modern teaching science.

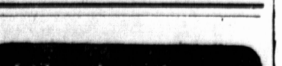

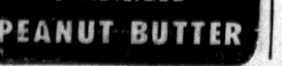
