

The Late Robert B. Weeks

The residents of Highfield and surrounding districts were shocked to learn that the Angel of death had claimed one of its most respected citizens, Robert B. Weeks in the early hours of Dec 11.

The late Mr. Weeks who was born in Alma, April 26, 1882 was a son of the late Ann Bowness and Stephen Weeks. He married Josephine Alexandra MacNeill of Nine Mile Creek forty-seven years ago and from this marriage ten children were born.

Bob, as he was affectionately known was a butter and cheese maker for over fifty years having charge of a factory at the age of sixteen.

He worked in plants at Tignish, Egmont Bay, New Dominion and Charlottetown retiring several months ago.

He moved to a farm at Highfield in 1912 and has lived there since then, in that locality. He was thought of very highly, and was always ready to help in the progress of the community. It can be truly said his friends were legion, his enemies none.

His company was sought from one end of P. E. I. to the other, as he was an accomplished violin player and step dancer, at one time being the champion step dancer of North America.

He had a wonderful disposition and loved children, and always spoke the best of everyone.

There are left to cherish his memory his sorrowing widow, also nine children, namely Florence, Mrs. Albert Templar, Suffolk; Albert in Edmonton; Bobby in Whitehorse; Stephen and Beth on the homestead; John in Winsloe; Alma, Mrs. Robert Vickerson, North River; Eileen, Mrs. Melvin Murphy, Halifax; Catherine, Mrs. Geo. Yeo, North River; and four sisters, Mrs. Hazel Cameron and Mrs. Harold Frait of Elmsdale, Mrs. Foster Gammell and Mrs. Edwin Murphy of Sea View.

The funeral which was largely attended was held in Highfield United Church under the direction of Mr. N. D. MacLean. The service was conducted by Mr. Heber Hardy assisted by Rev. G. F. MacLean.

The pallbearers were Messrs. Lemuel MacKinnon, Stewart MacFarlane, Joseph Curley, George Peters and Stillman Prizelle.

Interment was in the Church Cemetery.

Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan presided at the Queen's County Assizes yesterday and following the usual custom when no criminal cases are to come before the Grand Jury, was presented with white gloves by the Sheriff.

Justice MacGuigan made fitting reference to the first appearance of Hon. A. W. Matheson in the Court at this time as Attorney General. Following instructions to the Grand Jury regarding their duties and responsibilities, they proceeded to visit the various institutions and offices as directed. Members of the Grand Jury are: Heber Jones, Charlottetown (foreman); Frederick Driscoll, Johnston's River; W. L. Jordan, City; Harold MacDonald, Covehead; Robert MacKinnon, City; Samuel Kennedy, City; John Mustard, City; Emmet McQuaid, Kelly's Cross; Aben MacLean, City; Spurgeon Leard, St. Peter's Road; Eugene Kelly, City; Emmet MacDonald, City.

In the civil jury damages case of Lloyd Ford plaintiff, Allison MacLeod defendant, hearing was set for Jan. 17. G. R. Foster appeared for plaintiff, C. R. McQuaid for defendant.

In the civil jury damages case of Doris Campbell and Marina MacMillan, plaintiffs, Donald Kennedy and Austin Brown, defendants, hearing was set for today. Gordon MacMillan and Allison MacLeod are the plaintiffs. G. R. Foster and M. A. Farmer, Q.C., for defendants.

The report shows you have taken great care in examining equipment and buildings in the course of your duty. Your report is an example for the future. The report will be handed the proper authorities." Justice MacGuigan thereupon discharged the Jury.
