Police Report Shows More Convictions

A total of 1,633 court convictions on 1,717 cases taken to court was recorded by the city police department in 1961. Chief C. W. MacArthur gave the figures in his annual report and noted that this figure showed an increase of 193 convictions over the previous year. The number of arrests during 1961 was 1,377.

A breakdown of the total shows 257 Criminal Code cases; three cases involving breach of federal statutes, 107 provincial statutes, 274 traffic by-law and 1076 cases involving breach of other city by-laws.

Two minor accidents, one involving a late model Volkswagen car and the other a Maritime Electric Company service truck occurred on the highway a short distance west of Hunter River yesterday afternoon about 5:30'clock.

City's Trees Are Surveyed

Tree committee chairman W.J. Cox reported to the annual meeting that during the past year all trees in the city were surveyed and one fifth of them pruned and trimmed. The chairman reported that this work received much comment around the city and recommended that the remainder of the trees be done in the next four years.

Fire Dept. Honors Veteran Firemen

Two city firemen whose experience reaches back to the days of horse and hand-drawn fire equipment retired last night from the city fire department.

Members of the hose company, to which both men belonged, gathered at the firemen's room for a retirement party for the men. Presentations of silver trays were made to both.

Walter Perry joined the Rollo Hose Company in 1924 and when the department underwent a major reorganization in 1931 he was taken into the new Hose and Chemical Company.

He was on numerous occasions elected to the department executive and acted as department electrician. He had one of the highest attendance averages in the department over the 37 year period.

Lieut. William J. Bevins joined the Hose and Chemical Com-

pany in 1931 and had continuous service until the Second World War began. He served during the war with the Veterans Guard of Canada and rejoined the department after hostilities ceased.

Mr. Bevins was outstanding in sports at the firemen's tournaments and had a high attendance average during his years of service. Numerous years he had 100 per cent attendance at fires.

Both men recall fighting the major fires that have occurred in the city over the past years and compare the fire fighting capabilities of the department during the days before pumps and adequate water systems with the means provided today.

The long years of habit are not quickly forgotten and both men have attended every fire since they were taken from the strength of the company at the first of the year.

Ch'town Men's Clothing Firm Acquires Tip Top Dealership

T. Roy Cudmore, president of the firm of Henderson and Cudmore has announced it has

acquired the dealership in Charlottetown for Tip Top Tailors. The transfer of management includes the continued use of Tip Top premises on Grafton street, adjacent to the men's wear store of Henderson and Cudmore.

"In adding the Tip Top line of made-to-measure garments to our business," said Mr. Cudmore, "we trust that the goodwill and patronage of present Tip Top customers will continue under our management."

The firm of Henderson and Cudmore has been in business in Charlottetown since 1914, operating most of this time as a men's wear store. In December of 1960 the firm opened the Island's first and only exclusive boys' wear store.

The Tip Top store will be under the direction of Terry Knudson. Associated with him, will be Joseph Murphy, a member of Henderson and Cudmore's staff for many years.

During extensive alterations, now under way to accommodate the new haberdashery department, the Tip Top store will remain open.

N. Rustico Youth Given Jail Term

On charges of obstructing a person called upon to assist a peace officer in the performance of his duties, two young men from North Rustico yesterday changed their pleas from not guilty to guilty, before Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. in Queens County magistrate's court.

Both counselled by John J. Holmes, Douglas Gallant, was sentenced to 20 days in Queens County jail, and Joseph Arnold Gallant, by consent of counsel and Deputy Attorney General J. Arthur McGuigan, was remanded until Feb. 21 for sentence, on the charge.

Facing two counts, one of break and entry with intent to commit an indictable offence and the other of escaping lawful custody, James Arnold MacLellan, Souris, was remanded in custody until Feb. 7, on both counts, at the request of Mr. McGuigan.

At the request of the informant, Lorraine Mary MacPhee, a charge of common assault was withdrawn against Clifford MacPhee, West Royalty. In both the MacLellan and MacPhee cases, the defence counsel is Allison M. Gillis.

Following the taking of testimony, the case of Newton Jay MacKay, Sherwood, charged with speeding, was adjourned for judgement until Feb. 2.

Pleading guilty to possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence, an accused was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days in jail.

Mr. DeSilva stated that the completed work relates to the collection of vital statistics regarding land use, assessments, condition of buildings, and population density within the city area.

The provincial town planner noted that during the last year a considerable amount of planning and development has taken place within the city. The work involved the laying out of the 54 co-operative houses on North River Road and the re-planning of the Brighton district.

Another activity that has received our attention is the formation of the Metropolitan Planning Commission, largely through the efforts of G. Claude Smith, provincial director of planning. This organization is in its infancy, but the main thing is that there exists a representative body from the adjoining communities gathering as a forum to discuss common problems.

It was noted that one of the important planning exercises undertaken has been the work in connection with the proposed new provincial building. Mr. DeSilva stated that it was premature to discuss the detailed research and planning that has gone into this project.

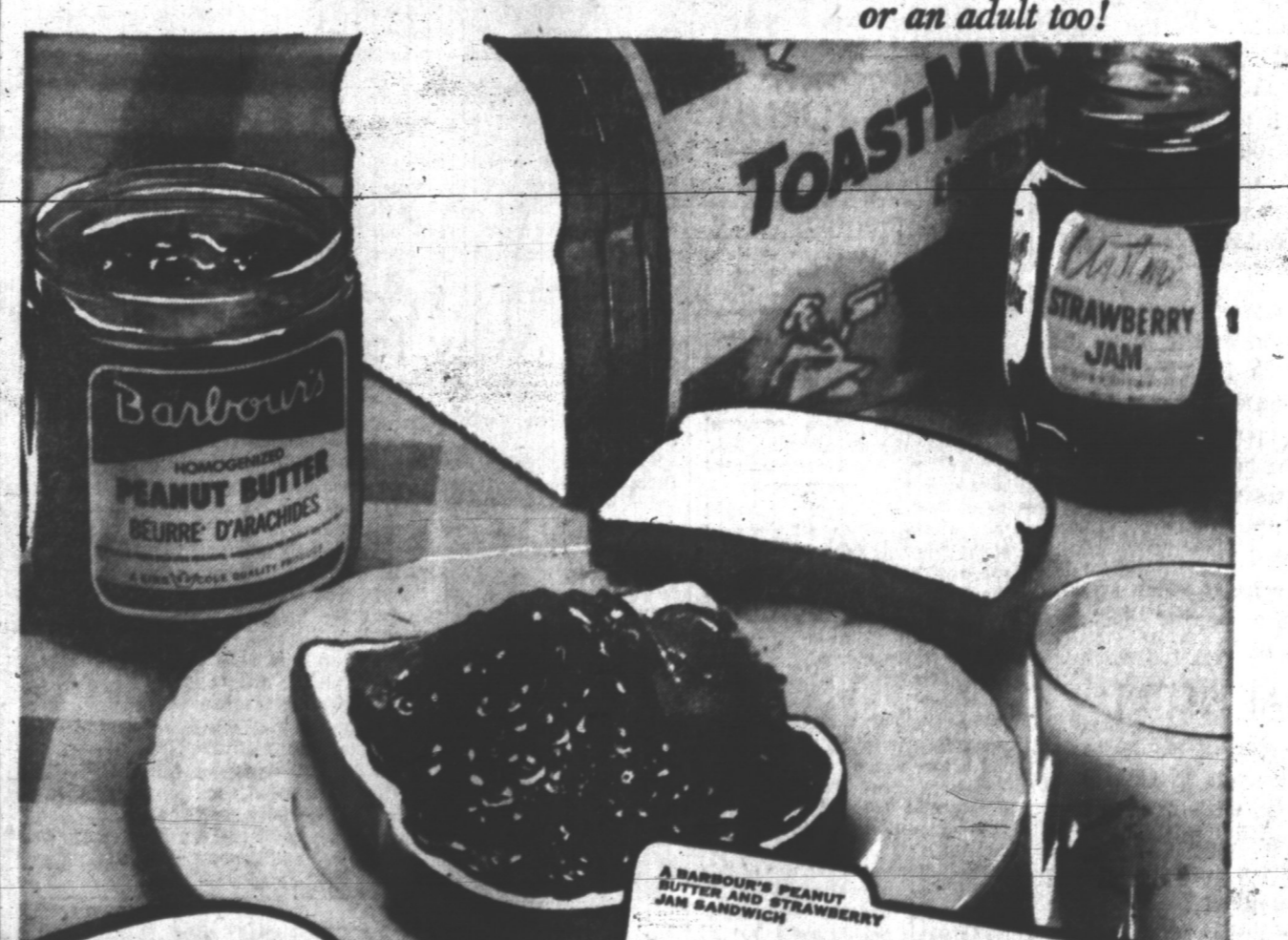
