THAT ELECTRIC QUESTION.

SIR—Mr. Walter Dault is getting too far ahead of our local age. Flash lights, such as he is turning on, and propositions which he makes, are too much at variance with our civic policy. Better keep those matters quiet. Hidden mines are never dangerous until they explode, and when they do the victim—blown to atoms—is never in a complaining mood. When this does occur under civic mismanagement the scorched ones will protest. Mr. D. is so far ahead of the age as to make his protest before the burning takes place. Some of our citizens are unreasonable enough to concur with him in this.

In the gates of September the wires in the vicinity of Bell's shoe store were crossed about midnight, burnt through and fell to the ground. The electric flame or sparks from one of these wires, as reported by the police, extended about six feet and illuminated the whole street. This fact was quietly hushed up from the press and the public, and yet not many feet from this place bare wires are running along wood, dry as tinder, without insulation; in one instance along a barn fifty or sixty feet long (rear of old Union Bank) and in other cases connecting with livery stables and storages of hay and combustible material. On the corner of Alley Street and Malpeque Road another wire is crossing full weight upon electric light wires, while further up the street some hundreds of feet of wire are tangled and coiled on the ground hanging from an electric post to break the legs of some passing horse and possibly the necks of the occupants of the carriage. But why enumerate; the evidences of neglect are on every hand. The "City Council" declines taking any interest outside of that which is of importance to his individual self and his personal retinue. Quashy burns out the fire alarm and should be compelled to repair it. Instead he is employed at the city's expense to repair it—or more probable to further spoil it.

Mr. D. objects that stone crossings and expensive works decorate central localities—mud and ashes are good enough for the outlying portions of the city. Let him be thankful that the "City Council" will even allow the ash cart to go that way for he cannot always be assured of that. There is only one thing certain, and that is the periodical visits of the tax-gatherer.

OBITUARY.

The remains of the late J. N. Arseneault, whose death occurred at the Charlottetown Hospital on Wednesday last, were brought here by morning train yesterday. Deceased was an old and respected inhabitant of the Magdalen Islands, and was a generous, charitable, and noble-hearted man. He was well and favourably known in Souris, and was sometimes called the "King of the Magdalenes." His many friends unite in extending their heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved widow and relatives.—Cor.

THE HARRIS-GOULIN SHOOTING

Harris Released on Five Thousand Dollars Bail.

CALGARY, N. W. T., Nov. 7.—The Goulin Harris shooting case continues to absorb public attention here. E. A. Harris appeared before Magistrate Winter yesterday to answer the charge of attempted murder. He was defended by Senator Longhead. A. L. Sifton, crown prosecutor, brother of the minister of the interior, is conducting the case for the crown. Mr. Sifton applied for an adjournment for one week, and Goulin still lies in a very precarious condition. The adjournment was granted. On Senator Longhead's application Harris was released on bail, giving as security himself in two thousand dollars, and Alderman Vanwart and H. Graves one thousand dollars each. Dr. Ings performed a long and difficult operation of sewing up the nine bullet holes in Goulin's intestines. The bullet which is lodged near the spine will be removed later by aid of the X rays. Goulin is conscious, his pulse strong, and his temperature is nearly normal. It is hoped he may recover. Public sympathy is almost wholly with Harris. It appears that Mrs. Harris told her husband she was going to visit a lady friend on Saturday afternoon. He left the house on a pigeon shoot. He returned an hour later and found his wife was not in the room, which are in the Thompson block. Harris then started to leave, but as he stepped from the building he noticed that the blinds of one of Goulin's windows were drawn. Goulin's bachelor apartments are in the same block. Harris' suspicions were aroused, and he went back to investigate. After listening at Goulin's door for some time he became convinced that his wife was inside and rushed madly at the door. It is supposed Goulin received the wound on his forehead from a shot fired while he was looking through the keyhole to see who was on the outside. The shot broke the lock, the door gave way, and Harris finding in the room absolute confirmation of his suspicions attacked Goulin who grappled with him, and fired at close quarters. During the struggle Harris' finger was bitten, one being broken. The terrific screams of Mrs. Harris brought Dr. Ings to the scene. It is generally believed that but for the timely arrival of Dr. Ings, Harris might have shot the pair.

GAMBLING AND OTHER EVILS.—Rev. F. D. McLaren, of Vancouver, in the course of a very masterly sermon a short while ago, said that in this country, old, married and single men are squandering their money, and, perhaps, in some cases, staking their eternal happiness on the turn of the cards around the tables in a gambling hell. In many saloons, others are qualifying themselves to fill the drunkard's place. In still more unmentionable localities others are trampling upon all that makes for the purity, strength, and sweetness of a noble manhood. What hope is there for the future of our country? What anticipations can we cherish in regard to the future of our cities, if, to any large extent, our young men, instead of being ruled by principles of gratitude and purity, cherish an ideal of life, which, is not flagrantly dishonest or shamefully corrupt, is at least, selfishly superficial, and heartlessly hard and worldly.

In the disputed question of the Common School Fund of old Canada, an arbitration has given an award in favor of Quebec and against Ontario, former partners in the legislative union, which is reported to amount to nearly \$500,000. The lands out of which the fund came were the joint property of the two provinces. After Confederation the Government of Ontario, in some cases, reduced the price, \$2 an acre, at which they had been sold, and in this way incurred the responsibility of recouping the amount, for which the award makes the province liable.
