ANOTHER SUDDEN DEATH

Mr. Geo. D. Davison Passes Away This Morning.

Another estimable citizen has been called away. Mr. Geo. Davison, a well-known and popular resident of Charlottetown, died this morning. Mr. Davison was busy about his store yesterday, apparently in the enjoyment of excellent health. This morning, shortly after nine o'clock, thinking he was sleeping longer than usual, his aunt went to Mr. Davison's room to summon him to breakfast. She found him lying on his side, apparently sleeping. Efforts to arouse him proving fruitless Dr. Kelly was called in, and it was found that he was dead. The end had come peacefully while he slept. He had entered upon his last long sleep about an hour before.

The deceased was a son of Mr. Henry Davison who for several years sat as a member of the City Council. He was about forty-nine years of age, and was a brother of Mr. J. Milton Davison, cashier of the Merchants' Bank of Prince Edward Island, and of Mr. H. M. Davison, City Clerk. His wife, who was a sister of the Messrs. White, of the Customs Department and the Registry Office, died some years ago. Mr. Davison was active in militia circles, and had attained the rank of Major in the 82nd Battalion. He was a good citizen in every sense, and all measures having for their object the betterment of the city or province had his approval. His father and mother, brothers and other relatives have our sympathy in their great sorrow.

FROM SONS OF ST. GEORGE.

British Widows and Orphans Are to Receive £1000.

A New York despatch reports that George H. Toop, master of the Harlem lodge, Sons of St. George, the supreme treasurer of the order for the United States, sent to the lord mayor of London to-day a draft for £1000 to be added to the fund for the benefit of the widows and orphans of the English soldiers who lose their lives during the Boer war. This amount is part of a fund raised throughout the United States.

TUBERCULIN TEST.—The Farmer says: Dr. P. thick, V. S. Beaque, has recently been inspecting herds in this vicinity, and four animals reacting to the tuberculin test have been destroyed, in accordance with the law, during the past week. In order to establish the reliability of the test, sections of the lungs of some of the animals destroyed were on Tuesday submitted to Drs. McNiel, of Summerside, Jenkins, of Charlottetown, and McKay, of Kensington. They all agreed that undoubtedly the animal from which the sections of lungs submitted had been taken suffered from advanced tuberculosis.

INDIA'S AWFUL FAMINE.—The last issue of the Missionary Review says: "India is entering upon the greatest famine of the century. Following upon two years of scarcity which have impoverished the country, the present year, with its almost total failure of rain, and the utter loss over large areas of two entire crops, leaves hungry millions in absolute and awful famine. Reviewing the situation, the viceroys said: "We are now face to face with famine of war and food and cattle which is unprecedented in character and intensity. The greatest aggregate famine area will thus be about 300,000 square miles, with a population of 40,000,000." Rev. G. P. Raymond will gladly forward any amounts given to him for the use of the Baptist missionaries in the Madras Presidency, who use the money in the direct relief of the suffering. He has already received and forwarded \$57.00. One dollar will feed a man, a woman, or two children for a month.
