# Leading Canadian Marksman Passes

HAMILTON (CP) — Harry Kretschman, 65, once Canada's leading marksman—he shot apples off his wife's head with a .22-calibre automatic—died Monday.

A first-class shot since his teens, Kretschman eclipsed all existing Canadian trap-shooting records for consecutive targets in 1948, when he broke 438 straight during five official competitions in three days.

He won the Canadian trap championship seven times; captured the Canadian handicap once, and was skeet champion twice. He was trap-shooting champion of the United States in 1933 and built a reputation as a marksman with shotgun, rifle and pistol, winning hundreds of awards.

## Andrews Chills Durelle In Fifth

NEW YORK (AP) — Paul Andrews of Buffalo, seventh ranking light heavyweight contender, knocked out Yvon Durelle of Baje Ste. Anne, N.B., Canadian light heavyweight champion, with a right to the head in 1:08 of the fifth round of a bout scheduled for 10 rounds Monday night at St. Nicholas arena. Andrews weighed 175 1/2, and Durelle 166 1/2.

Andrews started the fifth by concentrating on Durelle's body but when the Canadian went into a crouch, Andrews' long right found its mark on Durelle's temple. Durelle fell to his knees and took the full count in that position.

From the outset Andrews appeared the better boxer. In the first round he opened a cut over Durelle's left eye that the Canadian's seconds were unable to close.

The final result was obvious in the late stages of the fourth round when Andrews scored a series of combinations on Durelle's head which had the Canadian reeling in his own corner at the bell.

At no time in the fight did the Canadian champion prove any problem for Andrews. The official score cards of judges Joe Eppy and Americo Schiavone as well as that of referee Abe Simon showed Andrews winning every round up to the knockout.

Weill then came up with the announcement the champion definitely would be here Monday. Again, no Marciano.

If the doctors agree Marciano's wounds, suffered in his 15-round victory over Ezzard Charles here June 17, have healed, it is expected Weill and Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, will start discussing a fall fight for Marciano.
