Offshore Limit For Dragger Discussed In The Legislature

A suggestion that the Provincial Department of Industry and Natural Resources impress on the Federal Government the need of a three mile limit off the shores for dragger was made by Hon. J. Brenton St. John, Liberal, First King's, when he took part in the Draft Address debate in the Legislature yesterday afternoon.

Hon. Mr. St. John, Minister without portfolio, also suggested that in certain areas, such as Basin Head and Murray Harbour, a limit of six miles be laid down. He said that while the Government cannot make rules and regulations for our draggers, Federal legislation is needed to control draggers from other provinces.

He thought such regulations would eliminate any interference with the lobster grounds, shore fishing gear, and prevent destruction of the spawning shoals of cod and hake which are inshore in June and July. The dragger would benefit the inshore fishermen through increased catches which will permit the industry to supply and maintain new markets not now available because of a lack of regular and adequate supply.

Increase For King's

The speaker quoted the landed value of fish by species and Counties for 1951 and 1952 to show the great increase accruing to King's County since the advent of the dragger. In Queen's the value rose \$76,840 last year from 1951; Prince was up \$87,524; but King's County value soared \$262,267. Lobsters brought the greatest revenue with \$1,700,754, two years ago and \$1,889,851 last year.

Hon. Mr. St. John noted that many people were of the opinion that too much work was being attempted in Grade 11 in high school and expressed approval of the 12 grade system. He stated that many pupils entering Prince of Wales College third year or first year at a university found the work very difficult. He said that the people of Souris are proud of their school "where we have had a larger number of pupils passed in Grade 11 common examinations Board and our record will compare favorably with any school in the Maritimes."

The Montague Bison Bombers won the first game 17-10 against Souris in the Intermediate C hockey finals played at Montague last night. The game was a wide open scoring affair with both teams capitalizing on the best opportunities. made to expand the electric services to the limit of production of power in this Province. Rural electrification is a must, he stated, for populated areas such as Elmira, North Lake, Souris Line Road, St. Margarets, Bay Fortune, Souris River and other nearby communities.

Paved Road Requirements

In a brief reference to the Trans Canada Highway Mr. St. John said that as most of it was in Queen's County he was looking forward this year to seeing a paved road from Souris to North Lake. He approved of the Department policy of widening roads to aid in keeping them free of snow.

Mr. St. John said that in this Province we had been quick to take advantage of our position to supply farm products to agriculturally deficient areas. He thought we should be just as quick to take advantage of the fisheries situation but expressed the thought that the advantage might be counteracted by the distances to the larger markets of Central Canada and the United States. However, he hoped the policy of freight subsidies for feed grain might be expanded to the movement of other farm goods in both directions and also to fisheries.

The funeral will be held Thursday, March 12 at 2:30 from the Murray River Church of Scotland. Burial will take place in Murray River cemetery.

Continued from page 1 Ottawa saying the new increase bears inequitably on B. C. "not to mention other parts of Canada." He urged either suspension of the board's decision or payment of the increase out of consolidated revenue until freight rate equalization hearings have been held.

Premier E. C. Manning told the Alberta legislature he had conferred with Hon. J. Bennett and Premier T. C. Douglas of Saskatchewan and several Eastern Canadian premiers in connection with proposed action following the increase. He said the prime minister has been asked to have the transport board suspend its award until the appeal has been heard.

Urge Cabinet

In Regina Premier Douglas said he is joining the appeal and asking for suspension. Premier D. L. Campbell of Manitoba also sent a wire to the federal government asking for immediate suspension of the increase pending the appeal. He said he is "gravely disappointed" that the board allowed the increase and added that his province is "vital-ly interested" in adequate rail service. Railways must reduce costs to a minimum and seek more revenue through increased volume, rather than through increased rates, he said.

Souris Decides On Street Paving Project

In his monthly report to the Town Council on Monday evening, March 9th, Wilfred C. Wright, chairman of the Street Committee, announced that arrangements had been completed with the Provincial Government for the paying of one and one-fifth miles of permanent pavement at an estimated cost of \$14,400.00. Sixty per cent of this amount will be paid by the Provincial Treasurer out of Capital Grants to aid towns in lieu of income and gasoline taxes. The streets to be paved are Chapel Street; Hebrew Street to the C. N. R. right-of-way; Church Street to the C.N.R. right-of-way; Bell Street to the hospital and Breakwater Street.

Valleyfield Day Of Prayer Service

The World Day of Prayer service was held in the school room of the church, with Mrs. Dan MacKinnon as leader. The theme was "Walk As Children of Light".

The Call to Worship was read by the leader, followed by hymn "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee". Responsive readings were read and hymn "Lord Of All Being Throned" was sung. A period of silent prayer was followed by Lord's Prayer in unison.

Prayers were offered as follows: For Her Majesty the Queen, Mrs. Fraser; for homes, and families around the world, Mrs. Peardon; increased private and family prayer, Mrs. W. A. Bruce; followers of Christ around the world, Mrs. H. VanBuskirk; non-Christians everywhere, Mrs. Herb MacKenzie; peace, Mrs. R. MacKinnon and Mrs. Raymond Nicholson. Hymn 247 was then sung.

Mrs. Roy Gillis gave an interesting reading and Mrs. W. A. Bruce spoke briefly on World Day of Prayer services. The offering was received and the benediction closed the service.

The Council authorized the signing of a new contract with the R.C.M.P. for the policing of the town for a further period of one year and an amendment was made to the existing Parking By-Law authorizing the town policeman to issue warning tickets for infractions of the by-law. An infraction after the receipt of a warning ticket will render the offender liable to a fine. The policeman was issued with instructions to strictly enforce all provisions of the by-law.

In accordance with the Council's previous decision to collect outstanding taxes to help defray the cost of the proposed Street improvements, the Clerk was instructed to immediately prepare a yemized list of all defaulters and have the same published so that tax judgments may be secured and payments enforced.

Councillor Larter, chairman of the Fire Committee, in his monthly report recommended the placing of liability insurance on all the regular members of the Fire Department and thereby protecting them against accidents in the course of their duties. As a result of this recommendation the Fire Chief was authorized to place the necessary insurance. Councillor Larter also directed the attention of the Council to the increasing number of false alarms. These were apparently being rung in by children and it was agreed that if the offenders could be found their parents would be required to pay a portion of the costs incidental to the calling out of the firemen.

Correspondence was read from the Attorney-General's Department, the Provincial Fire Marshal, Hon. T. J. Kitcham, the Communications Branch of the Post Office Department and the Town Clerk of Montague. The Communications Branch of the Post Office Department was in reply to a request of the Council to have the Department provide a supplementary mail service by C. N. R. truck from Charlottetown to the Souris Post
