The \$10,000 Confederation Life Policy which he carries has an Accidental Death & Dismemberment Benefit. As a result, he received \$5,000 for the loss of sight of his eye.

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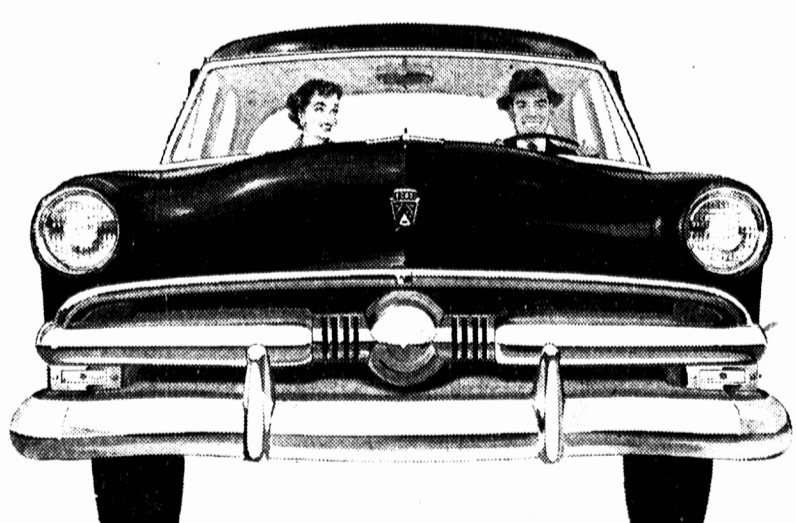
