AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 3 — (Special) — For the fourth consecutive year an Island farmer has been named Maritime potato king. The Maritime Winter Fair announced today that Ira J. C. MacMillan, farmer and potato grower of Cardigan, P.E.I., is the 1951 winner...

This 31-year-old farmer who operates a 210-acre farm with 60 acres under cultivation, grew 12 acres of potatoes this year compared with the usual seven acres in past years. While he and his late father, John MacMillan, who passed away eight years ago, have grown Green Mountains for the past 20 years, his crop this year was half-and-half Green Mountains and Sebago.

AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 5 — (Special) — Prince Edward Island exhibitors continued their winning ways at the Maritime Winter Fair here today as Island sheep and fox breeders practically made a clean sweep of the honors in their respective classes.

George A. Calbeck of Summerside led the way in the fox exhibition as he walked off with eleven of the eighteen first prizes available and also the male championship and reserve.

Other Island exhibitors who played a prominent role in the Island fox victories were Ernest F. Mill of Kensington, R. R. 4, George E. Woodside, Malpeque; G. F. Cameron and Jenkins Bros., Summerside.

Dunstaffnage made a killing in the Shropshire sheep classes as they took all the first prizes and automatically the male and female championships. The Stewart sheep which were shown by Allison Stewart possibly made the greatest showing ever made here in one breed of sheep. They took nine firsts, five seconds, two thirds, two fifths, one sixth and a seventh. In addition to winning the championships they also took the reserves.

A civic election to fill the office of Mayor of this city will be held Wednesday, November 23. It was unanimously decided at a social meeting of the City Council last night, Acting Mayor J.D. Stewart presided.

Following the passing of the resolution calling for the holding of an election he announced his candidacy for the office. When the meeting opened with Councilors L.E. Prowse and W.H. Beaton absent, Acting Mayor Stewart stated the meeting was called for one purpose only and that was to consider the writ of mandamus issued by the Supreme Court. He had City Clerk J.A. Fullerton read the writ. He then stated that the clause in the Act was ambiguous and "We were not clear as to the meaning." He also said ex-Mayor MacDonald had not been clear on it. They wanted an interpretation of the clause and now they have it.

"I personally am willing, content and anxious to abide by the law," Mayor Stewart said. "I suggest to you as a Council that we call an election as soon as possible." He said he did not think the Council should make any effort to contest the Chief Justice's decision.

AMHERST, N.S., Nov. 5 — (Special) — Cattle show men from Prince Edward Island, led by veteran exhibitors Guy Rodd of Brackley and Edison B. Mutch of North River, were more than holding their own against the best of the Jersey and Guernsey classes at the Maritime Winter Fair today. Guy Rodd made a one-man invasion into the Maritime Guernsey ranks and the Brackley show man emerged from the greatest Guernsey show ever witnessed here with as many championships and far more first placing than any other breeder.

Edison B. Mutch, along with Miller Henderson of New Wiltshire, made strong showing in the male Jersey classes. The top female honors in the young females and the dry female classes went to mainland breeders. Other Island breeders who exhibited animals in the Jersey classes were Arthur MacDonald of Forest Hill, Douglas Matheson of St. Peter's Bay, George MacMillan, Cornwall and Fred Kitson, New Wiltshire.

WEDNESDAY

ATTRACTION ATTENTION — Island products of every description on display at the P. E. Island booth at the Maritime Winter Fair in Amherst are attracting a great deal of interest. W. E. Agnew, director of trade for the Province reported yesterday. The products include canned goods, apples, dairy produce, sea foods, pottery, weaving and hooked rugs, presenting a varied and pleasing display, and an added attraction is the showing of films at the booth by the National Film Board. Much favourable publicity was given the display when Ira MacMillan of Cardigan, was crowned as the Maritime Potato King by Mrs. B. B. Jones of Southport, before a large crowd of newspapermen and photographers.

Tentative plans for the construction of a residence for nurses near the King's County Memorial Hospital were discussed at a special meeting of the hospital board at Montague last evening, which was presided over by the president, Mr. G.N. Rendell.

It was felt by the board that the present quarters for the nurses on the lower floor were inadequate, and some provision should be made as soon as possible to erect a residence. The new home, to be located on hospital grounds, would be designed for living quarters for the nurses, more of whom could then be maintained on the hospital staff, a necessity in view of the fact that the King's County Hospital is a 32-bed hospital serving a large district, and even now is

taxed to all its capacity to accommodate the number of patients. The annual hospital campaign will get under way on Nov. 19th, and it was felt that, if the collection was large, a part of it would be earmarked for the construction of the residence next spring. A campaign committee was appointed including chairman, Mrs. L.H. Poole, secretary treasurer, Mr. Arnold Wightman, and Mrs. G.N. Rendell, who will be responsible for organizing the campaign throughout the district.

THURSDAY

AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 7 — (Special) — The veteran showman Almon Boswell of Marshfield swept through the Cheviot and North Country Cheviot sheep competitions at the Maritime Winter Fair here this morning, as he took the major portion of the prizes and the money. In the Cheviot classes Mr. Boswell took six first placings out of possible eight. He also had the champion female ewe and reserve champion male. His chief opponent was Premier J. B. MacNair of New Brunswick.

Premier MacNair won two first placings, three seconds, a third, two fourths, a fifth and a sixth in the Cheviot classes beside showing the champion male sheep C. Eric Boulden of Windsor, N. S. had one fourths two seconds two thirds two fifths and the reserve female ewe. In addition to winning six firsts in the Cheviots, Mr. Boswell won three seconds four thirds a fifth and a sixth. He had two firsts, a second and two thirds in the three classes in the North Country competitions.

The first session of the Central Advisory Committee on Education for the Atlantic Provinces was held last night at the Prince of Wales College following a reception for the members at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Frank MacKinnon.

Following the opening remarks by the Chairman of the Committee, Dr. Watson Kirkconnell, President of Acadia University, and an expression of welcome by Dr. MacKinnon, Professor A.S. Mowatt, of Dalhousie University spoke on "The Universities' basis of prescription." He said that subjects should not be taught merely from the standpoint of facts, but also from the standpoint of the philosophical basis. High school matriculation should be made stiffer and only persons intellectually and scholastically prepared should be admitted to a university.

Mr. Gerald R. Foster, Charlottetown, was re-elected president at the annual meeting Wednesday of the Young Progressive Conservative Association of Prince Edward Island, which was held in the Empire Theatre. Other officers elected were:

Political interference was charged and strongly denounced in connection with the enforcement of lobster fishery regulations in a brief submitted yesterday to the Fisheries Development Committee by the Prince Edward Island Fisheries Federation. The public hearing of the Committee, at which Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presided, was held in the Law Courts building. The Federation brief being submitted by secretary A. Walthen Gaudet.

A suggestion that fisheries enforcement officers be given more specialized training and that their work be divorced from the development phrase was being considered by the Committee, the chairman stated.

AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 7 — (Special) — Prince Edward Island Ayrshire breeders, led by A. MacRae and Sons, of Charlottetown, Royalty, and Keith Boswell and Sons of Victoria, dominated the Ayrshire show at the Maritime Winter Fair here this morning as they won top honors in all the classes except one. The MacRae's climaxed a brilliant two day showing by winning the grand and senior female championships along with winning four firsts and an equal number of seconds this forenoon. They were the biggest money winners in the breed.

The Boswells from Victoria made a strong showing with their senior females and took their place with the best of the Ayrshires shown here. They won

three firsts, two seconds, a third and a fourth this morning as well as the T. Eaton Co. Trophy for the best four dairy cows. Almon Wood and Sons of Little York won a first, second, third and fifth. George Boswell of Frenchfort won a third in the only class in which he entered.

"Blackadder Miss Fashion, owned by A. MacRae and Sons, won the grand and senior female championship. She won both classes for aged cows in milk and her selection as grand champion gave the judge, Gilbert MacMillan of Huntingdon, Quebec little effort.

FRIDAY

A discussion on small fishing industries of this Province featured yesterday's session of the Fisheries Development Committee held in the Court House. Presided over by the chairman, Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, the committee held an open meeting and discussed possible ways of improving harbors to make the use of draggers possible.

Consideration was given to the special needs of the Rustico area which is one of the largest fishing areas here and the Committee will explore all possibilities of bringing aid to the fisheries of that section.

Dr. A. W. Trueman, President of the University of New Brunswick, and Dr. Clement Cormier, President of St. Joseph's University were the principal speakers at the morning session of the Central Advisory Committee on Education for the Atlantic Provinces. Chairman of the meetings, held in the Prince of Wales College, was Dr. Watson Kirkconnell, President of Acadia University.

Dr. Trueman spoke on "A norm for required College English," and discussed the many weaknesses in the teaching of English, emphasizing that students should have a thorough grounding in English before leaving high school. He described the significance of a good grounding in language and literature in the history of human culture, in communication between men, and in the creation and development of ideas. He said it is vital to human progress and individual thinking.

Speaking on "Summer Schools and University Credits," Dr. Cormier discussed the benefits of summer courses to ambitious students who could not take a full time degree course, but he warned that care should be taken to retain proper standards of university work. Summer courses sometimes require only a bare minimum of content, effort and thought.
