Norm Ullman Going Strong

Stan Mikita is leading the National Hockey League individual scoring race and is attempting to spearhead the Black Hawks to their first NHL championship in the history of the club, but when it comes to voting for the All-Star centreman in hockey's greatest league the gritty little pivot will have some stiff competition to contend with.

Norm Ullman of the Detroit Red Wings started off the current season with a red hot pace and led the NHL's pivot men in the mid-season All-Star voting, but then hit a slump in January and it was about the same time that Mikita got red hot and undoubtedly picked up valuable ground in the selector's minds. Ullman, 29 and a 10 year man in the NHL has surpassed the 20 mark for the eighth time in his "big time" career. He currently has 64 points, he should reach the 70 point bracket before the schedule expires on March 23. In Stanley Cup competition the shifty centreman of the Sid Abel coached forces has recorded 15 goals and 24 assists in 61 games. Last year was a big one for Norm in playoff hockey as he scored seven goals which included two "hat tricks" against Chicago Black Hawks in the semi-final and also contributed 10 assists.

Mikita is still only 24 years of age and has already captured a National Hockey League scoring championship and when he was 21 set two Cup records. Ullman may yet salvage his position on the first All-Star squad and this would mark the first time that the honor has fallen upon Norm who has been playing in the shadow of greats like Gordie Howe and Alex Delvecchio throughout his career with the Detroit club.

Norm is now the fourth highest Red Wing scorer behind Gordie Howe, Ted Lindsay and Delvecchio. The highest he has ever finished in the All-Star voting is third, but this may well be his year.

East Germany Pulls Upset By Defeating Yanks 7-4

By ROD CURRIE TAMPERE, Finland (CP)—East Germany was a 7-4 upset victory over the United States Tuesday night while Finland easily trimmed Norway 4-1 in the world hockey tournament's fourth round.

They were the only games scheduled in the championship round-robin among eight countries. Three games are on tap today including the first match of the 11-day tournament, Russia vs. Sweden.

The victories were the first for East Germany and Finland in the seven-round tournament. The U.S. and Norway each has lost four straight, and dropped to the bottom of the standing without a point.

Canada, Russia and Czechoslovakia boast perfect 4-0 win-loss records and are tied for first place with six points each. Sweden is fourth with five points, followed by Finland with three and East Germany with two.

Today, the Canadian team plays East Germany while Czechoslovakia meets Finland. The East Germans, who had scored only twice while yielding 18 goals in losing their first three games, twice came from behind to overtake the U.S.

It was an exciting match although the hockey never reached a high standard. Helmut Novy scored two goals for East Germany and his brother Erich one. Ulrich Noack, who plays with his brother Rudiger, scored one. Joachim Ziesche also got two for the East Germans and Joachim Franke one.

U.S. brothers Billy and Roger Christian each scored once and Paul Coppo and Tom Roe got the other U.S. goals. The U.S., 5-2 loser to Canada, did not enjoy the best of luck. Two of the East German goals came from shots that appeared to be deflected into the net off American sticks.

MADE 34 SAVES U.S. goalie Tom Haugh and his German counterpart, Peter Kolbe, each made 34 saves in a clean game marked by only four minor penalties, three of them to the Americans.

The American coach, Ken Yackie, said his squad played much better in the losing effort against the Canadians. "But we have to give the Germans credit," he said. "They hustled and scored some good goals."

In addition to the losses to East Germany and Canada, the U.S. was beaten 12-0 by Czechoslovakia and 5-2 by Sweden. East Germany previously lost to Sweden 5-1, Russia 8-0 and Czechoslovakia 5-1.

Finland led 3-0 at the end of the second period against the woefully weak Norwegians. Finnish goalie Juhani Lahtinen handled only three shots in the first two periods and made a total of 13 saves. Norwegian goalie Kare Ostensen stopped 29 shots.

Jarmo Wasama, Kalevi Numminen, Matti Rautalin and Ilkka Meisikainen scored for Finland while Jan Thoresen scored for Norway.

Delvecchio Paces Detroit To 3-2 Victory Over Habs

DETROIT (AP) — Alex Delvecchio's second goal of the night — with five seconds remaining — gave the surging Detroit Red Wings a 3-2 victory over Montreal Canadiens Tuesday night and moved them into first place in the National Hockey League.

Red Wings now have won six straight over all and have 11 consecutive games on home ice. Detroit has two more games to play than Chicago, which dropped to second place.

Delvecchio now has scored a point or more in nine straight games. Jean Beliveau of Montreal scored the only goal of the first period when he beat Roger Crozier with a shot from just inside the blue line.

Red Wings rallied and went ahead in the second period on goals by Delvecchio and Norm Ullman before Bob Rousseau knotted the score at 16:47. Ullman's goal, his 32nd, was his eighth in the last five games.

Red Wings had a two-man advantage for a minute and eight seconds in the second period but could get only one shot. But two seconds before Jim Roberts was due to return to the ice to put the Canadiens at full strength again, Ullman banged in a short pass by Gordie Howe.

Delvecchio's first came with Montreal changing lines. Delvecchio took a long pass from Howe and fired over goalie Charlie Hodge's shoulder. Montreal defenseman Jacques Laperriere lost his balance and crashed into the boards while trying to check Delvecchio.

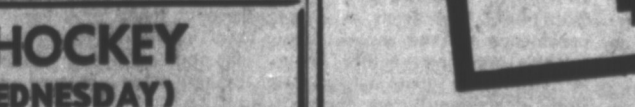


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
