**May Recommend Changes In Paroling Canadian Prisoners**

OTTAWA (CP) — Some major changes in Canada's methods of paroling prisoners may form part of a special committee's recommendations to the government, expected in about two months after a quarter of a year's study.

The question of a federal parole board — requiring perhaps five members to cover as large country as Canada — may be dealt with in the report of the committee headed by Mr. Justice Gerald Fauteux of the Supreme Court of Canada.

Representations for the establishment of such a board have come from many persons who presented briefs to the committee. The briefs urged such a board to replace the present system under which remissions are granted by the governor-general after recommendations by the solicitor-general.

Other major matters facing the committee, which now is preparing its report to Justice Minister Garson, include more time off for good behavior and a higher rate of probation.

In recent years, the justice department's remission service has undergone extensive reorganization. Prisoners may apply for parole after serving half their term. This unwritten rule does not apply in the case of long terms, when prisoners may apply before the half-way mark.

Remission service officials visit federal penitentiaries and large provincial jails twice a year to interview parole applicants. In each case they consider good behavior, response to rehabilitation treatment, reports of wardens and psychologists and prisoner department in interviews.

In 1955, 1,345 tickets of leave — paroles — were granted, a rise from 906 in 1954. There are about 5,500 prisoners in federal penitentiaries. A total of 243 paroles out of 924 granted in 1950 — 26 per cent — were revoked for various reasons, including later offences. The percentages in 1951 and 1952 were 23 per cent; 1953, 21 per cent, and 1954, 12 per cent.
