With quite a number of workers who have not completed their canvases, the eleventh annual Red Cross Campaign captains last night reported a total of \$3,160.73 collected in Summerside to date with very good prospects of reaching the objective of \$4,000.00.

The drive ended with a supper meeting held in St. Mary's Hall. Mr. Gregory Mulholland, Summerside chairman presided and after the workers had done full justice to the excellent repast provided by the ladies he extended his sincere thanks to the canvassers for the fine spirit of cooperation shown again this year.

Mr. Mulholland, regretfully noted the absence due to illness of Mrs. Ernest Mill, one of the most enthusiastic workers in the Red Cross in former years. He reported that flowers had been sent to Mrs. Mill and read a card of thanks from her in acknowledgement of the bouquet.

Mr. Judson Logan, chairman of the special names committee reported that to date they had collected \$1,438.75 and expected that approximately \$300.00 more would be received when prospects not in town at present returned home.

The chairman called upon Mrs. D. C. Tompkins in charge of collections at the R.C.A.F. station who announced that \$432.00 had been subscribed by the personnel there. Mrs. Tompkins expressed her appreciation of the manner in which she and her committee had been received at the port.

Mr. Mulholland said that a canvass of the civilian personnel was being conducted at the port and

in view of the various incomplete returns he expressed confidence that the objective of \$4,000.00 would be reached if not actually oversubscribed.

In closing he thanked all the various speakers who had assisted greatly by their radio appeals.

During the evening an enjoyable sing-song was held led by Mr. Allison MacLean with Mr. Albert Huestis at the piano.
