PROPOSED LOBSTER REGULATIONS.

Deputation Waits Upon the Minister.

The Minister's Views and Explanations.

OTTAWA, March 15. Messrs. Gillies (Richmond, P. Q.), Macdonald (P. E. Island), Macdonald (Victoria), McDougall, McLean (P. E. Island), Stairs, Dickey, Burns and Adams waited on the Minister of Fisheries yesterday relative to the proposed lobster regulations. They are opposed to license fees and fees for labeling, but not to the principle of licensing and officially labeling, provided the law provides that licensees shall be given to all applicants not guilty of violating the regulations. They think that the official labeling will increase the saleability of lobsters abroad. The Minister said that their views impressed him very much and would receive his consideration. Subsequently, in the House of Commons, in reply to Mr. Davies (P. E. Island), Hon. Mr. Tupper said that the draft regulations sent out last autumn embodied all recommendations made by experienced persons, and were distributed merely to provoke discussion, with the idea of submitting to Parliament a bill containing those regulations which withstood criticism. The desire to have the fullest possible discussion was the reason why the regulations are proposed to be put in the bill, instead, as ordinarily, in a mere order-in-council.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Estimates.

SOME OF THE ITEMS.

OTTAWA, March 15. The estimates were submitted yesterday. The total expenditure on account consolidated fund is set down at \$36,230,420; on capital account, \$5,317,760; total \$41,548,180 or \$2,502,064 more than in the previous year. \$25,000 extra is down for drilling the volunteer militia; but the same amount is saved on clothing, etc. \$152,000 is devoted for increased railway accommodation at Halifax and \$45,000 for new sidings; \$14,000 for extension of Intercolonial accommodation, increased to \$121,000, and \$6,500 voted for increased accommodation at St. John. \$10,000 extra, or \$30,000 in all, are asked for building and maintaining the fish breeding establishments. Among the grants in the estimates for harbor improvements is \$14,000 for P. E. Island.

OTTAWA, March 15. In the House of Commons yesterday, Charlton's bill for the suppression of obscene literature, etc., was read a first time.

In reply to a question, Sir John Thompson said that there was no need of amending the Controverted Elections Act so as to Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Judges could give decisions in the six months' limit, as there was no difference of opinion among the Judges.

Prompt Payment. WINNIPEG, March 15. The Canadian Pacific management finding evidence that a conspiracy has been formed, partly through outside influence, to bring about a strike of its conductors and brakemen on its Western division, decided to dismiss all who are found to be disloyal, and the dismissal of all such commenced on Sunday. Every man refusing to stand by the Company was promptly paid off.

West No thumberland. OTTAWA, March 15. Reports point to another Government success in West Northumberland to-day. But the personal popularity of the Grit candidate makes some doubtful of the issue.

Weather Bulletin. TORONTO, March 15. 10 a. m. Westerly winds, fair weather; not much change in temperature.

Personal. The Earl of Denbigh is dead. D. G. M. Dawson, F. R. S., the Canadian commissioner in the Behring Sea arbitration, has returned from Washington, the negotiations having been concluded. The doctor is, of course, unable to speak of the results of his work. They will have to be made known through diplomatic channels, when the reports of the commissioners are presented.

Referring to a Washington telegram published by THE EXAMINER, a subscriber at Kildare writes: The statement in THE EXAMINER of March 4th was not correct regarding the family of Capt. Robert Turnbull, whose son William D. was killed in Chile last autumn. There are three Annie, Grace and Mary—in the United States; and one, Janie, in Charlottetown, and one son, Robert B., who left Charlottetown three years ago and has not been heard of since. Mrs. George T. McRae, of Tignish, is not a daughter of the second wife, as stated in THE EXAMINER, but the only child of his first wife.

LECTURE IN Y. M. C. A.—On account of illness, the lecture on "Prince Charlie," which was to have been delivered in the Y. M. C. A. lecture room tomorrow evening has been postponed. Dr. McLeod will, however, take Mr. Breckon's place, and his subject, "The Physical Basis of Thinking" should attract a large audience. The lecture on Prince Charlie will be delivered at a later date.

An Indian outbreak in Bolivia has been quelled by Government troops after a severe fight, in which 1,000 Indians and 30 Government troops were killed and wounded.
