SOURIS — Some 450 young persons from the Souris Regional water safety day camp yesterday enjoyed the comforts of the Legion Home here when unfavorable weather ruled out aquatics.

The camp opened Monday morning when Cyril Gallant, chairman of Souris Red Cross water safety committee, met hundreds of children and volunteer workers from the majority of the 24 districts within the high school region.

About 115 pupils come at 9 a.m. every day for a two-hour program of water safety films, physical health, swimming and life-saving.

Members of the Souris Lions Club, assisted by Lionettes, have carried out all the local arrangements of bus transportation, living accommodation for staff and other essential details of the camp.

Links In SuperGang Are Sought

PALERMO, Sicily (AP)—Italian police turned to the FBI in the United States Tuesday to complete their roundup of a super-gang they said binds together the Sicilian Mafia and the American Cosa Nostra.

Informants said Palermo police were approaching the FBI concerning the four wanted men they have not yet captured. All are believed to be in the United States.

International police arrested 10 gang leaders Monday, including the reputed kingpin of the Mafia in a series of pre-dawn raids from northern Italy to eastern Sicily.

All are suspected of a variety of crimes, including narcotics and currency smuggling.

Three of the four sought are U.S. citizens. Italian authorities listed Giuseppe Cerrito, 54, Los Gatos, Calif., a friend of the late Charles (Lucky) Luciano; Santo Sorge, 57, New York, and Gaetano Russo, 72, New York.

The fourth man was identified as Gaspare Maggaddino, 57, wanted since last October in connection with several Sicilian bombings. He was reported to have relatives in Buffalo, N.Y.

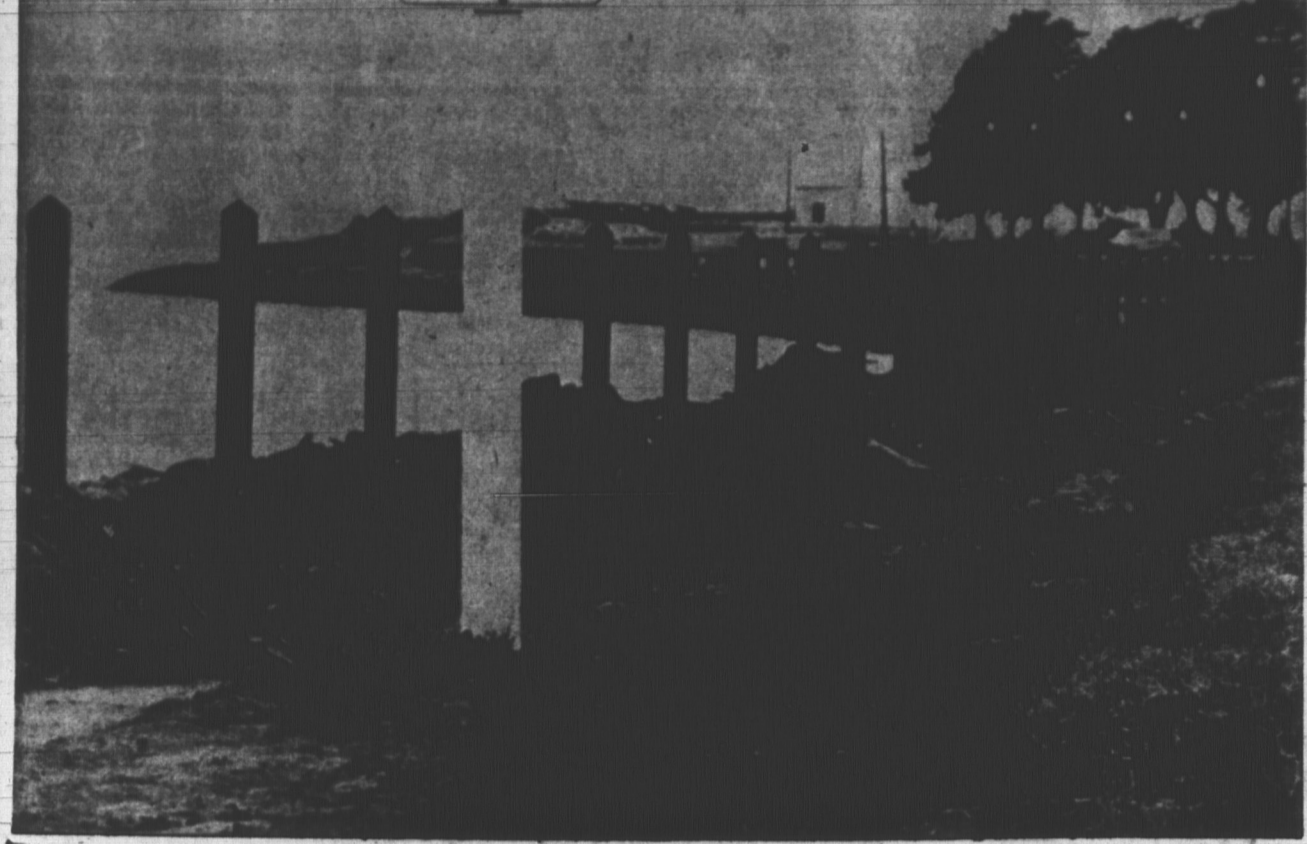

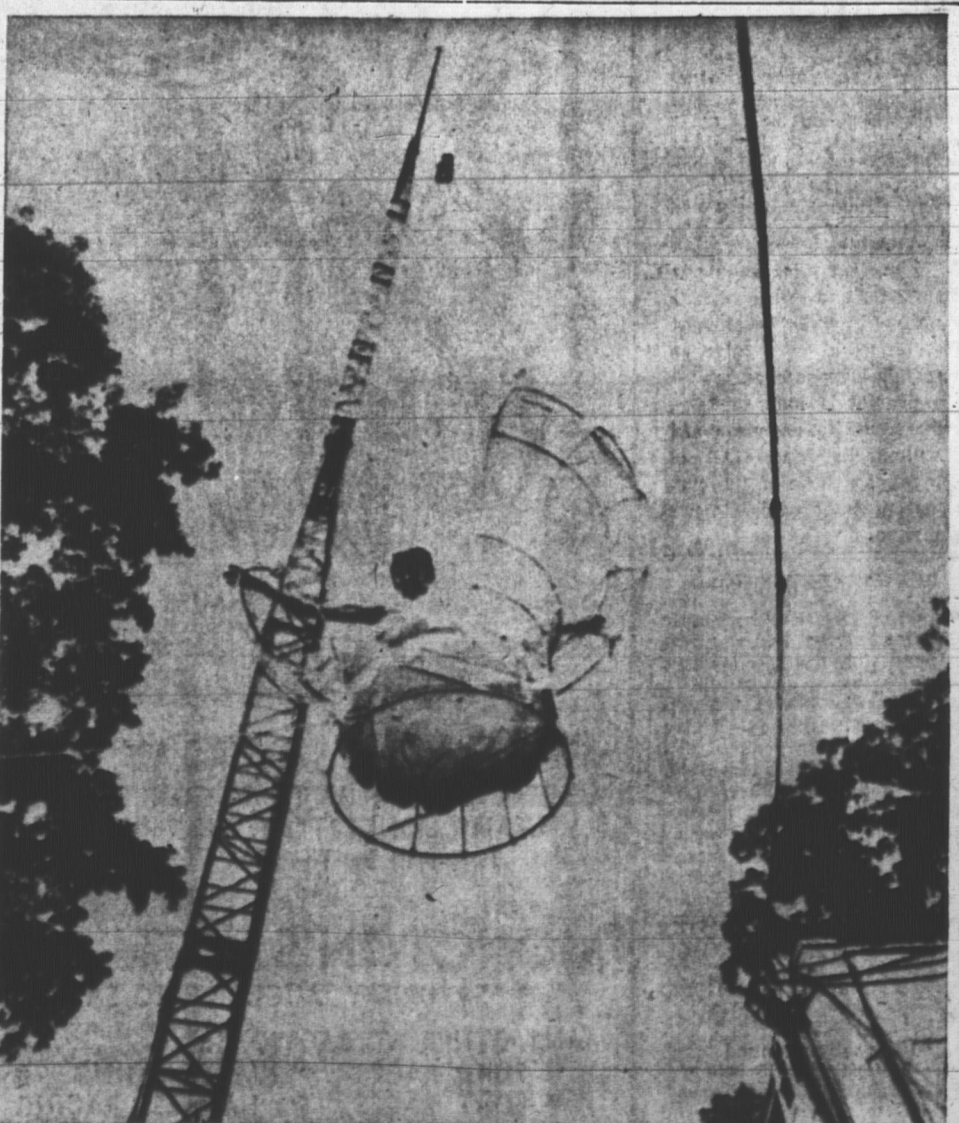

works projects valued at some \$70,000,000 and to extend for three years to 1970 cost-sharing programs with the provinces involving construction of vocational schools, Trans-Canada Highway and sewage treatment facilities.

Government economists say these measures in themselves will have some impact. But they stressed that at least equal importance should be attached to the prime minister's statement "urging others" (in the private sector) to do likewise.

The mid-year private and public investment forecast released Monday night by the trade department, showed that governments account for only \$1,546,000,000 of the estimated \$8,355,000,000 to be spent on construction during 1965. It also showed that, while capital spending plans in the public sector have held relatively steady, estimates for the private sector have risen six per cent since the first of the year.

PICKING UP SLACK
Part of the construction problem lies with the fact the industry had been operating prior

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
