

Canadian Indians Seek Income Tax Exemption

SARNIA, Ont. (CP)—Canada's provincial governments by the British North America Act and were loaned to the federal government during wartime. The only power to collect the tax must come from the provincial governments, who don't demand it of Indians. He said it is "taxation without representation" because treaty Indians cannot vote in federal elections outside of British Columbia, Ontario and Nova Scotia. The federal government holds the purse strings on band funds, so permission is necessary before the money can be used to bring a court action.

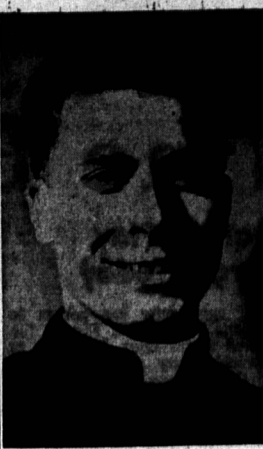

Many Cases Before Court in Geo'town

At the Magistrate's Court in Georgetown yesterday, parties from Georgetown, Murray Harbor and Montague, each charged with driving with more than three adults in the cab of a truck, were each fined \$2 and costs or three days in jail, and a party from Point Pleasant, charged with the same offense, was fined \$3 and costs or three days.
