Messrs. Ings Bros., sons of John Ings, Esq., of this city, who are credited with 650 head of cattle and 60 horses. The statistics show a rapid enlargement of the stock interests in the Northwest. The increase of cattle is nearly one hundred per cent., and that of horses well on to one hundred and twenty-five.

The Myrtle Navy tobacco is not burdened with the usual costs which swell the price of most articles to the consumer; the firm employ no travellers whatever, their orders come to them instead of being sought by them. The merchant does not require to keep a large stock on hand swelling his price with interest, for the factory is an immediate source of supply to him, at the cost of a postal card, or at most a telegram. He loses nothing, therefore, from being overstocked. The article is a staple one, for which there is a constant demand as for wheat or flour, and the merchant can therefore, sell it at a minimum rate of profit.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Canadian News.

OTTAWA, April 27. Sir John A. Macdonald was out driving yesterday.

Sir A. J. Campbell is better, and sat up for a time to-day.

The beef supplies for the Indians in the Northwest were awarded to-day at a considerably lower rate than last year.

The Senate will meet to-morrow. Some interest is expressed as to the plan of getting over the difficulty of the Leadership of the Senate, there being but one other member of the Cabinet in that body, and he is not accustomed to the conduct of public affairs.

Warden Laviollette, of St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary, who was shot in the revolt of prisoners, is reported better to-day, and the doctor is in hopes of saving his life.

St. Patrick's Literary Society waited upon Hon. Mr. Costigan to-day to request him to introduce into Parliament resolutions approving the course of Gladstone in the matter of Home Rule for Ireland. The Minister promised to consider the request, and answer later on.

News from Mandalay. LONDON, April 27. Lord Dufferin, Viceroy of India, telegraphs from Mandalay that all is quiet there. The country, however, is much infested with rebels. The cholera, he says, attacked the 43rd regiment with such violence while ascending the Irrawaddy River that the whole regiment had to be disembarked at Yenangyung. Fourteen deaths have occurred. The sick were placed in hospital, and the healthy soldiers of the regiment were moved up the river and put into camp.

The New Brunswick Election. TORONTO, Ont., April 27. The Mail says:—"The Local Government of New Brunswick has been sustained at the polls. As Mr. Blair and his colleagues are known as Reformers, their victory is already regarded as a bad blow to the Dominion Government, and by and by we shall doubtless be told that a tremendous reaction has set in down east. The fact is, that the New Brunswick elections had no bearing whatever upon Dominion affairs."

Parliamentary Doings. OTTAWA, April 27. The House met at 8 o'clock. Hon. Mr. White, Minister of the Interior, introduced a bill to amend the Act regarding subsidies in land to certain railway companies. He said the object of the bill was to authorize the Government to grant land subsidies, hitherto granted in alternate sections, in solid townships.

A Rumor Denied. LONDON, April 27. The Sultan of Harran, in Asiatic Turkey, by whom, it is said, the scientific expedition under Count Perro was massacred, also captured 25 Indian soldiers but afterwards released them. The report that the British outposts at Suakin had been surprised was incorrect.

Another Artist Gone. PARIS, April 27. Eugene Louis Gabriel Isabry, a noted French painter, and author of the picture "Temptation of St. Anthony," is dead.
