**Shaving Lotion Case Heard In S'side Court**

Evidence was heard yesterday before Magistrate R. S. Hinton. K. C. against a Summerside store charged under the Temperance Act with possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor. The liquor in this case was shaving lotion manufactured by well known manufacturers. This is the second such case to come before the Summerside court recently. In the first case the defendant pleaded guilty.

In the case yesterday Cat. D. S. Davis testified to seizing a quantity of shaving lotion from the store and on being tested it showed various quantities of alcoholic content up to 55 per cent by volume.

Defence counsel argued that the Temperance Commission had gone beyond its powers in making a total prohibition of the sale of such merchandise and in so doing has attempted to seize absolute power not given it by the Legislature.

He said that it puts the Crown in the position of being able to pick and choose whom it wishes to prosecute as it is common knowledge that such preparations are generally on sale.

Mr. Harold Goodwin acted for the Crown and Mr. D. L. Matheson and Mr. J. A. Gallant for the defendant.

The case was adjourned for judgment. Three highway traffic cases were disposed of at the same sitting. A party for operating an over-loaded vehicle was fined \$5 and costs and a party for operating a vehicle without an operator's licence was given the same fine. Another person for operating a vehicle without proper lights was fined \$2.00 and costs.—S
