# Khrushchev's Party Berth Develops Some Lumps'

Ten years ago this week, Nikita Khrushchev took command of the Soviet Union. He has brought it face to face with a revolution all its own.

Now, 60, Khrushchev is comfortable but he is full of lumps. He is not, as he once was, being comfortably berthed at the top, but the berth has its lumps.

Sometimes because of his measures, sometimes in spite of them, Khrushchev has foundered at home over a burgeoning rebellion among the rising Soviet generation. Abroad, the Soviet Union's needs as a great and rich power have clashed with the demands of a global conspiracy devoted to violent revolution.

Paradoxically, after 10 years, Khrushchev seems at the peak of his personal popularity in the Soviet Union although he has had many failures as the leader of world communism and has seen the movement split.

On Sept. 12, 1953, the party announced officially what was long suspected: Khrushchev was his first secretary.

### SHOCK TREATMENT

A shock treatment began. A year later Khrushchev was the target of an incredibly shocking state of Soviet agriculture.

Three months later Lavrenty Beria, Stalin's loyal police chief, was executed as a spy and subject of a wave of subsequent executions left the secret police structure with diminished power. The party moved in the direction of a new order.

Khrushchev early in 1953 forced Georgi Malenkov out as premier, the party chief then

looked off on his own "peaceful" brand of diplomacy which he contended would give communism its greatest triumph.

The biggest job of all came early in 1956 when Khrushchev denounced Stalin as an egomaniac blunderer and murderer who had put to death tens of thousands of loyal Communists.

Anti-Stalinism became a potent instrument in Khrushchev's strategy to thwart enemies who tried to overthrow him later. It had its dangers, too. The relations it engendered contributed to unrest in the satellites and military threats as instruments stamped out by Soviet forces.

### WRITERS STUBBORN

De-Stalinization was a profound effect on communism in Europe. Khrushchev, because of it, the party failed to win a complete victory over rebellious writers and artists who briefly had taken the party's line as their own.

It probably will mean that a steadily taking over from the older, will change the character of Soviet communism. And rifts deepen and multiply among Communists around the world, de-Stalinization will have contributed much to that development.

Khrushchev's publicly expressed scorn of Stalin's "cult of personality" made his view of the hierarchy show old status, as Malenkov, Nikolai Bulganin and others have moved in. Now, with few exceptions, the old Bolsheviks are gone. The leadership of the Red Chinese party remains in the hands of the men in their own, that of the

There was less and less justification for rigid dictatorship, and even the much-lauded menace of "U.S. imperialism" failed to provide the excuse among a population now accustomed to contacts with the outside world. The Khrushchev policies caused divisions in the Communist world and weakened Moscow's central control over the world movement.

Inside the U.S.S.R. there were rising expectations of more and improved economic growth and the use of the economy for world politics.

Young liberals—intellectuals, writers, artists and even economists—were feeling their oats. It was to the point of near-rebellion.

These were only a few symptoms of deep Soviet change. Khrushchev, whether he intended it or not, has been responsible for much of it if a pace continues—as appears likely—the Soviet Union will be a far different country from the one Stalin left 10 years ago.

The price for the Kremlin is likely to be steady decline, centralized control of the Red book and the Communist party around the world.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Republican Senate Leader Everett M. Dirksen threw the weight of his prestige behind the limited nuclear test-ban treaty as decisions on ratification of the pact.

Dear Mr. Becker, I would like to tell you about a hand that happened to me many years ago and which I have not gotten over yet. You occasionally run hands where enormous swings take place because of an error in bidding or play, or plain bad luck, but I want to nominate this one as a leading candidate for your column of horrors.

It was a rubber of expert game we held the East cards. I wasn't playing for buttons but I had a club and I modestly ventured a diamond. Sure enough when it was next my turn to bid, the opponents were in four hearts. I bid four spades, South five hearts, and North six hearts.

I had bid, confident that a club lead would defeat the contract. Since the opponents had voluntarily bid the slam, my double, according to the law, was a doubling convention, forbade partner from leading either suit I had bid. The double called for a lead through the suit dummy had bid.

Unfortunately, my expert partner, who was not so expert in this hand, led the right of spades. Declarer played low from dummy, winning with the queen, ruffed a diamond, entered with a hand with the queen of hearts, ruffed a diamond with the ace, and then drew five more rounds of trumps.

These plays reduced dummy to the AKQJ of spades and d the king of clubs. I had to keep the 10-3 spades and ace of clubs. Declarer now led a club and I was forced to concede the last three tricks in dummy. So the opposition scored 1,220 points in the deal.

But if West had led a club, we would have been plus 1,000 points instead. The opening lead cost us 2,220 points and that ain't even if you're playing for buttons! Cordially yours, John Q. Jones
