BEHRING SEA PROTECTION.

What Secretary Sherman Has to Say About it.

Correspondence that May Create Resentment in England.

LONDON, July 5.—The Washington correspondent of the Chronicle asserts that official correspondence is about to be submitted which includes a despatch sent by Secretary Sherman to Ambassador Hay, dated June 10, for submission to Lord Salisbury, insinuating that England has been guilty of bad faith in carrying out the terms of the Paris seal award. The correspondent says: "There is no doubt that the publication of this despatch will cause resentment in England." Lord Salisbury has not yet replied.
 In a later despatch Secretary Sherman complains that while America maintained five vessels to prevent illegal sealing in Behring Sea, England had only two.

Mob Seize a Mosque.

LONDON, July 5.—A despatch to the Times from Simla says that a mob there tried to seize a mosque, but the police and troops opened fire and a serious conflict ensued. Finally the mob was repulsed with heavy loss.

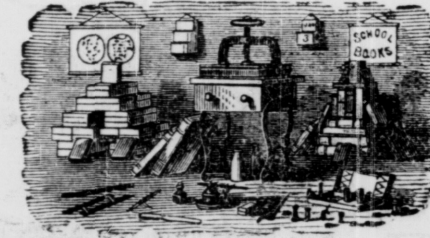
A Disastrous Collision.

CALCUTTA, July 5.—The British bark Overdale collided with the steamer Pandua off Hoogy Point, and sank. All on board were drowned except the captain and one seaman.

One Jump Too Many.

NEW YORK, July 5.—Capt. W. S. Keeple, who had some reputation as a jumper from bridges and masts of vessels, was killed jumping from Brooklyn Bridge yesterday.

CALCUTTA, July 2.—The rioting has ended, a compromise on the plague measures having been arranged between the authorities and the rioters, whereupon the disturbances have immediately ceased. The absence of rain is causing the greatest anxiety throughout India.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

HALIFAX, July 2.—Mary Morris, a well known squaw over seventy years of age, was run over and killed by a train on the Dominion Atlantic Railway near Newport last evening.

CALCUTTA, July 2.—In the fighting which took place in the suburbs of Chimpere between the police and the rioters, during which the former were compelled to fire on the latter, many policemen were injured.

LONDON, July 2.—A despatch to the Times from Cape Town says that President Kruger has telegraphed Dr. Leyds to return to Pretoria immediately, giving as his reason his own illness and important matters of state.

CALCUTTA, July 2. (2a. m.)—The situation in Chitt is now more reassuring, but the police patrols were compelled to fire on the rioters. It is estimated that one time more than 5,000 were holding the northeast portion of Calcutta. The number of killed and injured is not known but it is believed to be considerable.

LONDON, July 2.—The newspapers of this city express great anxiety at the occurrences in India, intimating that the mass of the natives there are less content under British rule than was generally believed and that a rebellion of unpleasant proportion may be threatening. Constant communications are passing between the Indian and home governments.

HAMILTON, Ont., July 2.—Hamilton is likely to lose another of her factories. Lovell Bros., cigar manufacturers, Canon street, say they feel the burden of the new tariff so heavy that they will at once shut down. They will remain shut down for three weeks, and, according to one of the members of the firm, if after that there is no change in the tariff they will likely move the establishment either to the State of Washington or to California.

HOPWELL HILL, July 2.—Chas. Archibald, an exponent of the anti-Scott Act party at Albert, who has been working up cases against several well known merchants, for selling bay rum, was, on Saturday, fined \$25 or three months in jail for drunkenness and profanity. Archibald, it was shown in the evidence, got intoxicated with the bay rum which he purchased to prove its intoxicating properties and secure evidence against the merchants.

BOMBAY, July 2.—The assassins of Lieut Averst, of the commissary corps, who was shot and killed by concealed natives, while leaving the governor's reception at Caneehind, on the evening of June 22, jubilee day, Plague Commissioner Rand being dangerously wounded at the same time, are still at large. The aggressive attitude of the natives prior to the shootings were remarked. There were whisperings of impending disaster to Europeans and it is thought that the whole native community, including the police had foreknowledge that something was going to happen. On jubilee night a delayed anonymous letter arrived at Commissioner Rand's bungalow, saying: "You will die to-day and the queen will die two days after. Many others will follow, and the soldiers will all be killed."
