

A Boy Should Have a Trade.

What about the boy who does not take up with a trade or profession? Look around and the question is speedily answered. He must cast his hook to any sort of pond and take such fish as may be easily caught. He is sort of tramp. He may work in a brick yard to-day, and in a harvest field to-morrow. He does the drudgery, and gets the pay of the drudge. His wages are so small that he finds it impossible to lay up a dollar, and a fortnight of idleness will see him dead broke. The other evening I saw a man dragging himself wearily along and carrying a pick on his shoulder. "Fred John?" "More so than any horse in Detroit." "What do you work at?" "I'm a digger. Sometimes I work for gas companies but often for plumbers." "Good wages?" "So good that my family never had enough to eat, let alone enough to buy decent clothes. If it wasn't for my wife and children I'd wish for the street car to run over me." "Why didn't you learn a trade?" "Because nobody had friendship enough to argue and reason with me. I might have had a good trade and earned good wages, but here I am working harder for \$8 to \$9 a week than any man does to earn \$18. And now my boy, if you tell you that the trades are cowardly, and that so many carpenters, and blacksmiths, and painters, and shoemakers, and others trades keep wages down, pay no attention to such talk. Compare the wages of common and skilled workmen. Take the trade you seem fitted for. Begin with a determination to learn it thoroughly, and to become the best workman in the shop. Don't be satisfied to skulk along from one week to another without being discharged, but make your services so valuable by being such a thorough workman that your employer cannot afford to let you go.

ANECDOTE OF SIR WILLIAM GULL AND A DEAF PATIENT.

In the life of Sir Robert Christison, late Professor of Materia Medica in the University of Edinburgh, recently published, there is the following story of Sir William Gull and a deaf patient:—Sir William told us the following delicious tale of stupid unreasoning faith in quacks: An elderly man consulted him about stomach complaints, but there was a formidable obstacle to diagnosis in the patient being born-deaf. What do you have for dinner? roared Sir William into his right ear. "O, no," was the "plenty of that—two mles regularly after breakfast, and two more before dinner." "How long do you lie in a quack?" "Well, doctor, I shall be sixty-nine this day three weeks." But at the door he turned round, and in the loud rattling tones of one very long deaf, called out, "Doctor can you cure deafness?" Sir William bowed, shook his head, and made his lips express "No." "You have been very kind to me: Therefore I make you welcome to this prescription, which he pulled from his pocket adding, "It cured me."

How A Woman Keeps A Secret.

It is an old quip upon women that they cannot keep a secret; but the fact is they are the only part of humanity that can. A wife keeps a husband's secret incomparably safer than he does hers. We calculate that there is one drunken wife to about four hundred and ninety-nine drunken husbands. In gambling, licentiousness, lying, cheating, hypocrisy, covetousness, there is pretty much the same proportion.
