

Prov. Red-Cross To Select Two High School Delegates

Since this is Junior Red Cross Week in Canada, a meeting of the Provincial Junior Red Cross Committee was held at Red Cross Headquarters in Charlottetown yesterday afternoon. Mr. K.A. Parker, president over the meeting which was well attended.

Members of the Committee who were unavoidably absent from yesterday's meeting are, Miss Charlotte Gordon, Public Health Nurse of Montague, and Mrs. Al-an Andrew of Charlottetown who represents the Home and School Association on this committee.

The main topic for discussion at yesterday's meeting was the International Junior Red Cross Study Centre to be held next summer at the University of Toronto in Toronto when there will be 140 delegates from 40 countries in addition to 65 Canadian delegates. Two Prince Edward Island High

School delegates will be chosen to represent the province at this Study Centre. The 17,000 Junior Red Cross members in Prince Edward Island will be given an opportunity this year to finance the expenses for one foreign delegate to this Study Centre by contributing towards a special Junior Red Cross Fund which is being established for this purpose to be known as the "I.R.C. Fund (International Friendship Fund)". At yesterday's meeting the Provincial Committee endorsed this type of Conference and recommended the participation of our young people in this project.

Members of the Junior Red Cross Committee offered their assistance to the Provincial Director, Mrs. Paul Devlin, in planning and carrying out a High School Red Cross Conference to be held on a Saturday in October.

Vernon R. Man Pleads Guilty To Break Charges

A Vernon River man was handed a two-year suspended sentence when he pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking and entering and theft before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet in Queen's County Magistrate's Court Wednesday morning.

Evidence given showed the accused had made restitution and the crown suggested a suspended sentence. He was released on a \$500 peace bond.

A resident of Montague was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days upon pleading guilty to a charge of having illegal possession of liquor.

A resident of Bristol appearing on a charge of driving a motor vehicle while his ability to do so was impaired had his case further adjourned to October 3rd, after three witnesses were heard.

Fines of \$10 and costs or 10 days were given a Longworth Avenue man when he pleaded guilty to using licence plates other than those issued by the motor vehicle branch and to a Kinkora resident who pleaded guilty to speeding.

A New Haven truck driver received a fine of \$10 and costs or 10 days when he pleaded guilty to operating a motor vehicle on the highway without having due care and attention for other motorists.

A \$5 and costs fine or five days was meted out to a Charlottetown youth when he pleaded guilty to failing to stop at a stop sign.

Court Accepts Resignation Of Rev. W. Harold Brown

At a pro re nata meeting of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island held Wednesday morning in the Kirk Hall of St. James' Church, the resignation of the Rev. W. Harold Brown, Minister of Zion Church, was before the court for consideration. The Moderator, Rev. E. H. Bean, presided, with the Clerk, Rev. T. H. B. Somers, at the desk.

The Clerk stated that Mr. Brown's resignation was placed in his hands at the end of August, that he at once notified the Moderator who had called the special meeting, and had cited the Kirk Session and Congregation of Zion Church to appear.

Mr. Brown was asked to state his mind and pointed out that his health was such that he felt he could no longer assume the heavy responsibilities of the Zion pastorate.

On behalf of the Congregation a grateful tribute was paid to the

work of Mr. Brown by Mrs. Sutherland, by Mr. Preston B. McLaine, and by Mr. W. Blair MacDonald.

On behalf of the Presbytery Rev. E. H. Bean spoke in appreciation of Mr. Brown's help with Camp Keir, and the Clerk, Rev. T. H. B. Somers, of his fine friendship with Mr. Brown, and wished him well in the future.

Rev. D. A. Campbell also expressed his regret at Mr. Brown's departure.

To all of these remarks Mr. Brown made grateful reply and stated he would always remember with gratitude the loyalty of so many of his parishioners and the friendship of his fellow Presbyters.

The Court then released Mr. Brown as and from 30th September and appointed Rev. Chas. Townsley of St. Columba's Church, Marshfield, interim moderator of the Kirk Session of Zion Church.

Island Delegates To Nfld. Return After Busy Sessions

In wind-up sessions at St. John's Tuesday night the Premiers of the four Atlantic Provinces authorized a pilot study of the St. Lawrence Seaway, while the annual meeting of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council went ahead with plans to establish a special committee to chart the future economic growth of the four-Province area.

The Island delegations, 23 strong, arrived home last evening on an MCA chartered plane.

In Premier A.W. Matheson's party were: Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Hon. J. George MacKay, Hon. B. Earle MacDonald, Hon. Alex. MacIsaac, Robert MacLeod, W.E. Massey, Eugene Gorman and George Frases.

Dr. Frank MacKinnon, the president, headed the Island's 11-man delegation to the APEC meeting.

In a summary issued after the conference's closing sessions, both of which were held in camera, the four premiers were quoted as deciding on the Seaway study because of the impact its completion may have on the economy of the area.

ALL SPEED

During the closed sessions the premiers also discussed a report on the development in the field of farm credit, and reaffirmed a resolution passed in Charlottetown last September calling for the establishment by the federal government of a regional farm loan board.
