No Pension Means Test PC Candidates Promise

"It appears as though the Liberals intend to reinstate the old age pension means test" the people of Pownal were told Saturday night at a meeting addressed by J. Angus MacLean and Heath Macquarrie, Progressive Conservative candidates in Queens.

Hammering the statements of health and welfare minister Judy LaMarsh in which she suggested pensions should be paid on the basis of need and that pensioners in P.E.I. require less than those in Toronto, the Conservative candidates told the meeting that such a proposal would "go hard on the people of P.E.I."

"Many of you remember the old means test, the candidates pointed out, "with investigations of properties, income and every other penny you have. "Our proposal is straightforward, with an immediate increase of the pension to \$100 monthly for all our senior citizens."

The Conservative (gammatas) pledged removal of the 11 per cent sales tax on building materials. "This tax bears heavily on every individual, particularly on our young people who are just getting started on their own. Whether they are building or renting homes they feel the squeeze of this tax," the two men stressed.

Speaking on Conservative party prospects in the forthcoming election, Mr. Macquarrie and Mr. MacLean said there is "a new feeling of determination and unity in our party and the election prospects are good. "People voted in 1957 who had never seen a Progressive Conservative government," the teammates pointed out "This

time the memory of Conservative records and achievements is clearly before us.

ASSURED UPSET
"In the 1957 election the people of this province provided the four Conservative members that assured the Liberal upset", and your votes are even more important this time.

"If there seems to be no interest in this election it is because the people have already made up their minds on many of the issues, particularly the moral issues, the men stated.

"The Prime Minister was unable to clean the Ottawa house and is leaving the cleanup to the electorate", the teammates continued. "And there is plenty of evidence on which the electorate can base an election verdict."

Speaking briefly on public opinion polls, the candidates noted that while such polls are interesting, they are not accurate because "the seats are not where the people are." The calling of the election before redistribution of ridings has caused much public resentment," it was said.

Season's First Speaker Will Be Arctic Traveller

The major address to the season's opening meeting of the P.E.I. branch of the Association of Canadian Clubs will be delivered by Eric W. Morse of Ottawa, who will take as his topic "By canoe across the Arctic barriers — Hudson's Bay to Alaska."

The opening session will be held at the Charlottetown Hotel on Wednesday, and will get underway at 6:30 p.m. The speaker will be introduced to the gathering by F. Walter Hyndman, chairman for the occasion.

Mr. Morse was born in India and came to Canada as a boy and later attended Trinity College in Port Hope, Ont. Going on to Queens University he obtained his MA in modern history and political science. He

was awarded the R.B. Bennett scholarship in international relations, which resulted in his attending the School of International Studies in Geneva, Switzerland.

During World War Two he served with the RCAF and was demobilized with the rank of Squadron Leader.

From 1945 to 1946 Mr. Morse held the position of national secretary of the United Nations Association in Canada. Since 1946 he has been national director of Canadian Clubs.

RETRACED ROUTE
As a special project, Mr. Morse spends his summers retracing the routes of the early explorers and fur traders across Canada by canoe. He recently completed, during four vacations, peddling from Hudson's Bay to Alaska in the general latitude of the Arctic Circle.

As a writer, he is the author of a book entitled "Canoe Routes of the Voyagers (1952)." Among his other interests he is a Fellow of the Royal Canadian Geographic Society, a member of the board of trustees of the National and Provincial Parks Association, and a member of the Historic Advisory Committee of the National Capital Commission.

Following the conclusion of the main address the members will then hold their annual meeting during which the election of officers for 1965-66 will take place.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says temperatures in the Maritimes had dipped below the freezing point at many localities late Sunday evening as arctic air engulfed the district. The highest temperature on Sunday at Summerside, P.E.I. was a chilly 42 degrees. This was one degree cooler than the previous coolest maximum temperature on record for this date at Summerside.

The high pressure area producing the clear skies over the district will move southward today. In its wake, a strong westerly flow of warmer air will develop over the three provinces. While Nova Scotian skies should remain clear, clouds will spread over Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick late in the day.

Regional forecasts:
Prince Edward Island: Sunny becoming cloudy in the evening. Much warmer. Light winds increasing in the morning to westerly 25, gusts to 40. Low-high at Charlottetown 30 and 53.

CITES FACTORS

Besides conversion costs there was the problem of retiring the present equipment as well as increasing fail stations between Charlottetown and Souris, said Mr. Auld who expressed hope in having the entire Island converted to the dial system by 1975.

Improved customer service, and staff working conditions mentioned at the meeting were to be considered by Mr. Auld.

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Lost License, Gets \$50 Fine

The accused was arraigned in City Police Court.

In sentencing the accused the Magistrate pointed out that a car was the most lethal weapon there was if it was let get out of control. He warned the accused that if he appeared in court on a similar charge again he would lose his license.

Two Charlottetown youths charged with disorderly conduct were each given similar fines of \$15 and costs or five days.

Edward Francis Mitchell, Stanhope, charged with failing to stop at a red traffic light was fined \$10 and costs or five days. John MacNeill, City, convicted

on a similar charge was also fined \$10 and costs.

Merrill Brown, city, charged with speeding was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Three persons charged with illegal possession were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days and two other accused drew fines of \$20 and costs or 20 days each.

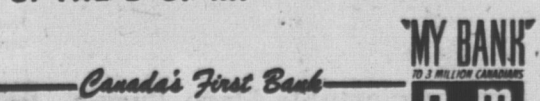
