90-Day Term Imposed In Theft Case

A 90-day jail sentence was imposed on Lawrence Doton of Parkdale by Magistrate A.J. Haslam, Q.C. in city police court yesterday for theft of an article valued at less than \$50.

The case of Maurice George Gormley, charged with retail selling of a preparation containing liquor at 230 King Street, was adjourned to Jan. 15.

George M. Brookins of Montague was fined \$15 and costs or five days for speeding.

Richard McGee, Charlottetown, was remanded without bail to Jan. 11 on a drunk and disorderly charge. One person was fined \$20 and costs or 20 days for being drunk and incapable.

Eight accused were each fined \$5 and costs or two days for failing to stop at a stop sign.

Severe Storm Hits In Nfld.

GRAND FALLS, Nfld. (CP)—Nearly two feet of snow driven by high winds fell on parts of northern Newfoundland Friday but highway crews were able to

keep most roads open to traffic. The Notre Dame Bay community of Botwood was heaviest hit by the storm. Snow began falling in the area shortly before midnight Thursday and by late Friday nearly two feet of wet snow was down. Residents said it was the worst storm in years.

At Tilt Cove on Bonavista Bay, all roads were blocked most of Friday but highway crews were working around the clock to open them. Line crews were also working in the Tilt Cove area in an attempt to restore electric power service lost Wednesday during a severe street storm. Drifts in many areas measured 15 feet.

Dickie Moore Will Talk With Imlach

MONTREAL (CP)—Dickie Moore is going to have a talk with Punch Imlach about Moore's future with Toronto Maple Leafs.

Moore said Thursday night, the eve of his departure Friday for Toronto.

"All I can say for the moment is that I am returning to Toronto to have a talk with Punch Imlach.

"I won't get back into condition by warming the bench. I skated recently and I felt well."

Moore was a National Hockey League star for years with Montreal Canadiens. He retired after the 1952-53 season and was picked up last summer by Toronto Maple Leafs in the draft, who gambled that Moore could overcome his old problem of gimpy knees and get back into condition.

Although he was dressed for 16 games this season, Moore has seen little action with Leafs. He returned to Montreal before Christmas to recover from an injury.

Moore did not say when the talk with Imlach, Leafs' general manager, will take place.

LAGERS. Milder air was starting to move into southwestern regions and temperatures in most places will rise slowly. Light snow had started in extreme southwestern Nova Scotia, and some snow will fall also in New Brunswick through the night. By this morning, temperatures will be getting high enough for the precipitation to turn to drizzle and intermittent light rain which will spread, northeastward, reaching Cape Breton later in the day.

It is expected that the cold air pushing down across northern Ontario will not reach the region before the first of the week, so that Sunday should continue cloudy and mild.
