Lengthy Service Shows Unique Record Of Four

Four veteran members of the Prince Edward Island Legislature have a total of 87 years of service in the Provincial House. One of them dates back to 1919 when he was elected at the age of 23 to become one of the youngest members to sit in the Island Assembly. Although he has served the least time of the founders in the House, Stephen Hessian, Q.C., from Montague recalls when "as a slip of a boy" he served under the John H. Bell administration. He represented the Georgetown District in 1919-23 and after being out of the House for four years came back to represent the Cardigan for 1931-35. Although closely associated in politics during the next 20 years he did not resume his seat in the legislature until the general election of 1955. Colorful and dramatic in his delivery, members of the House always look for an enlivened period of debate when "Steeve" gets to his feet. His speeches are made without fear or favor and a government member is as often the target of his criticism as the Opposition, if he feels it is warranted. Russell Clark has represented the 3rd District of Queens continuously since 1932. With his son

George Saville through his ability to observe weather conditions was many years ago nicknamed the "weather man". First elected to the Legislature in 1935 he had contested a seat in the Georgetown District as far back as 1927. At 78 he is second oldest sitting member but there are very few occasions when Mr. Saville misses an opportunity to speak. His stories of large speckled beauties caught are the envy of every member of the House. Mr. Saville's long experience and sound judgement are greatly respected by both sides of the Legislature. He is particularly vociferous in his demands when they concern the Fifth District of Kings. Three-Storey Building Guttled By Fire Early This Morning

A fire which broke out shortly before 2 o'clock this morning appeared to have gutted a three-storey rooming house at 39½ Water Street. Police said they got everyone out of the building safely. An early count indicated six persons occupied the building. Police said they were: Mrs. Violet Henderson, Louis Wilfred Hughes, the owner of the building, Mrs. Dorothy Yates, Richard Power, Harry Rayner and Ivan Maftin. The fire was discovered when police noticed smoke uptown. Investigation led to discovery of the fire minutes later. The building was full of smoke but even at the height of the blaze little flames appeared. However, the building was described as "guttled."

Police first on the scene were Sgt. Lloyd Wakelin, and Constables Russell Downe, Charles Ready and Leo MacDougall. Police said several persons were in their bare feet and were carried from the building to prevent them having to walk in the snow. It was considered quite possible the prompt action by police saved the lives of some of the occupants of the building. The Cavendish Apartments were next to the burning building to the west. It was not known immediately who lives next to the east.

Hunters Must Keep Distance

Hunters will have to confine themselves to 200 yards from any occupied school, church, meeting place or dwelling, farm building or cattle without the permission of the owner thereof, according to a clause passed during amendments to the Fish and Game Act yesterday.

The section of the act read 100 yards but Fred Ramsay (L-1st Prince) objected to the distance, claiming that the nearness of the hunter to such designated structures could constitute a hazard to people, especially children.

F. A. Large (L-1st Queens) agreed with Mr. Ramsay and moved an amendment to the section. In the resulting vote, Mr. Large's amendment carried with Premier Matheson, M.M. Bell and Brenton St. John voting against it. The vote was 17-3 in favor of the 200-yard amendment.
