

Coaches Think Team With Better Passing Has Edge

TORONTO (CP) — The head coaches for the teams in the East-West All-Star Shrine football game were Saturday both agree that the outfit with the better passing has a definite edge in such a clash.

On that basis Doug (Pea)head Walker's Eastern All-Stars should be heavy favorites over Frank (Pop) Ivy's Western all-star aggregation when the teams collide at Varsity Stadium in Canada's counterpart to the United States Shrine game held annually in San Francisco.

The East admittedly has the best two passers in the country in Sam Etcheverry of Montreal Alouettes and Tom Dublinski of Toronto Argonauts. This fact confronts the West with double trouble considering how the Alouettes passed so well in a losing effort in the Grey Cup game when only Etcheverry was on the firing line.

However, the memory of Esk's trussing ground attack in that

game lingers and it makes the West's chances better than they would be ordinarily, even though Ivy and Walker agree there is not enough time to prepare a strong ground offensive. It involves a lot of meticulous detail in timing and blocking which can't be achieved in only a few days practice.

NOT DISCOURAGED

Ivy, however, is not too pessimistic. He intends to run Edmonton's basic split-T attack and with 14 Eskimo players he has enough familiar men to make it fairly effective. The Esk players include the first-string backfield of quarterback Jackie Parker, fullback Normie Kwong and Johnny Bright and halfbacks Rollie Miles and Earl Lindley.

"They'll no doubt miss the crisp, hard blocking of the full Eskimo line. However, the West's all-star offensive lineup includes three Edmonton players who know exactly what to do in the split-T offense," Ivy said Thursday from Ham-

ton where the Western team is working out that the non-Edmonton players are adjusting to his offensive surprisingly well.

"They're all great players and can pick up the ideas of what to do real fast," he said.

"All-star games are a little different proposition from a regular game. It's difficult to install a complete offense and generally a team with the best passing attack can handle the game much easier. We're not a passing team, so it would be foolish of us to try to outpace Etcheverry and Dublinski."

Both Walker and Ivy have agreed to use a basic 5-4-3 defence. Walker said they decided upon this because neither had

enough practice time this week to set up the offensive blocking to cope with several different defence setups. It would also help to guarantee a wide-open game.

Jockey's Both Horses In Big Daily Double

BALTIMORE (AP) — Danish jockey Benny Sorenson rode the winner of the first and second races at Pimlico Thursday to provide a whopping \$5,932.20 for a daily double payoff.

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Canadiens Eke Out 2-1 Decision Over Boston

BOSTON (AP)—Montreal Canadiens scored twice while Boston was short-handed in the first period and held on for a 2-1 victory over the Bruins in a National Hockey League game Thursday night.

Montreal's Jean Beliveau, a Bruins' nemesis, and Maurice (Rocket) Richard scored within a span of 26 seconds to upset Boston.

Boston, winless in nine games, missed a tying goal in the third period when Don McKenney was offside. Murray Costello's shot from the side of the rink went into the netting but did not count.

With the Bruins short-handed due to a cross checking penalty on Vic Stasiuk, Beliveau converted the second poke at his own rebound just beyond the post at 4:47. Beliveau had entered the contest leading the league with 14 goals and 27 points. It was his 10th goal of the season at Boston's expense.

Just 26 seconds later, Richard slammed home a 25-footer into the corner of the net. One of the Bruins' lone tallies at 13:45 of the first period on a 35-foot blast.

Besides missing a tying goal, the Bruins were stopped by some fine goal tending by Montreal's Jacques Plante in the furious 15-second period. With a minute and 15 seconds left in the game Boston pulled out goalie Terry Sawchuk in favor of six skaters but could not break through.

Carmen Basilio Happy; Next Opponent Saxton

BOSTON (AP)—Elated over his "most satisfying victory", welterweight champion Carmen Basilio Thursday said he intended to defend his crown next against Johnny Saxton, praised Tony DeMarco and blasted referee Mel Manning.

"Saxton stepped out twice to let me fight DeMarco and he deserves the next chance," said Basilio. "I'm going to beat him, too. As for the date I will have to wait and see. Both of my hands are sore but the doctor said he didn't think there were any breaks. I'll have the hand X-rayed in Syracuse in a few days."

"De Marco is a real tough fighter. He hits harder than anyone in the welterweight division. He'll have to learn to pace himself. I must say this was my most satisfying victory because I knew I would have to knock DeMarco out to win here. I could tell by the way the referee traded me in the infighting."

"The referee gave me no breaks in the infighting. He nearly pulled my arm off a couple of times in breaking. Whenever I was getting in some good punches inside, he'd break us, give me a mean look and snarl at me. I told you to break." He'd tell DeMarco softly, "Break Tony!"

Primroses Shade Flyers In Penalty-Studded Game

Dave MacLeod's goal with less than four minutes to play in the final period gave the Montague Primroses a 7-6 victory over the Parkdale Flyers in a penalty-studded game of the Island Hockey League at the Sports Arena last night.

Marred by 21 penalties, four majors and two match-misconducts the game produced little in the way of good hockey in the first two periods but the boys settled down in the third and made a game of it.

The Primroses lost the lead three times in the first canto and came out of it trailing 4-3. The Flyers pulled into a 5-3 lead early in the second but Montague evened the score before the siren sounded and the period ended 6-6.

MacLeod and Apps Arsenault each fired two goals for the winners. Phil McGee, Billy Hughes and Dick Carroll setting the others. Willie Dunnigan in a wrestling match for a pair for the loser. Skip Carver and Junior MacLeod the others.

It was wild and woolly game and right from the outset the players went at each other with fire in their eyes. Although there were only 3 penalties called in the first 20 minutes the boys were carrying their sticks a little high throughout with plenty of heavy body checking.

The flareup started early in the second period when Willie Dunn and Phil McGee tangled in a wrestling match after Dunn had received a minor penalty for tossing his stick against the boards. Both players were thumbed off with majors. Montague defenseman Mac MacLeod joined them in the box a couple of minutes later. No sooner had the sin-bin been emptied but Cuddy Gregory was sent off in his first of three penalties in the period. Dave Jardine was the next offender at 14:32 and Gregory was back to keep him company 26 seconds later.

It was about 2 minutes after this that the big battle took place between Dick Carroll and Skip Carver. Both players were given majors at first but when they resisted the referees tagged them with match-misconducts and they spent the rest of the game watching from the sidelines. Following this the Flyers received a team penalty for having too many players on the ice served by Gregory, and the same player was back in

the box at the 19:09 mark serving time for tripping.

The third period produced the only good hockey of the night. The players had tamed down somewhat and the referees were standing for no such nonsense as went on the first two periods. Only four penalties were called and the fighting subsided.
