The Victoria Times says Larry Regan former National Hockey League star who has coached in Austria, will be the first full-time manager-coach of Canada's national hockey team. The Times says Regan is to get the job because of his familiarity with European hockey. The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association decided on the hiring of a full-time manager-coach earlier this week. CAHA secretary-manager Gordon Jukes said Wednesday night the association has several candidates in mind.

Ian Hagemoon, 24-year-old Canadian centre and defensive tackle, has been signed to a second season by Edmonton Eskimos of the Western Football League. The Eskimos said an operation on Hagemoon's knee after last season apparently was successful.

New York Rangers named veterans Harry Howell and Don Marshall assistant coaches of their National Hockey League team recently. The club also said that Howell, a defenceman, and Marshall, a forward, have signed their 1965-66 contracts. They will assist Red Sullivan, who recently was relieved as coach for one year.

Ron Turcotte Day will be held in Grand Falls, New Brunswick, July 1 in honor of the small Grand Falls native who has become one of North America's leading jockeys. The 23-year-old jockey made Tom Rolfe to victory in the Preakness this month after placing third in the Kentucky Derby, behind Lucky Debonair and Dapper Dan. His next big test will be the Belmont Stakes.

Did Cassius Win With Karate?

TORONTO (CP)—Frank Hatahita of Toronto, a vice-president of the International Judo Federation, agreed Thursday that a heavyweight champion Cassius Clay may have knocked out Sonny Liston with a karate blow in their title fight in Lewiston, Me., Tuesday night.

Hatahita, who is also president of the Canadian and Pan-American Judo Associations, was commenting on a statement made by British karate expert Dillon MacCarthy in London that Clay's knockout punch was developed from karate, a deadly method of Japanese combat.

After seeing a television film of the fight, MacCarthy sent a telegram to the British Boxing Board of Control saying: "Urgent protest—Liston was knocked out by a karate blow. Imperative you act."

MacCarthy told the LIVING Star that the blow was delivered just behind the ear, a classic karate blow at the carotid artery which can kill a man. He also said that Liston's retirement in the sixth round of his first fight with Clay was caused by a karate blow.

Hatahita said he consulted Mas Tsuruoka of Toronto, president of the National Karate Association, and agreed the punch could have been a form of karate.

"They twist the fist on impact and it can have a great effect inside the head," Hatahita said. "There is a nerve centre behind the ear and if the blow lands there it can weaken a person. A boxing glove would diminish the effect of the blow, but even with a boxing glove the blow can have a weakening effect if it lands on the right spot."

Hatahita said that without a boxing glove, such a blow could be lethal.

He also agreed that Liston could have been the victim of a karate blow in his first fight with Clay.

TOKYO (Reuters)—Seven leftist students protesting the arrival in Japan of the U.S. nuclear submarine Snook were arrested here Tuesday after a clash in which four policemen were injured. The Snook berthed Tuesday at the U.S. naval base in Sasebo, on the southernmost Japanese island of Kyushu.

Clay Denies Fight Fixed Wants Bout With Chualo

CHICOPEE, Mass. (AP)—Heavyweight champion Cassius Clay Thursday rejected charges of a fix in his controversial one-minute, first round knockout of Sonny Liston Tuesday night at Lewiston, Me.

At a press conference at his training camp at Schine Inn, Clay also said he wanted to meet George Chualo of Toronto before taking on Floyd Patterson.

The champion predicted that a flood of what he called white hopes will emerge in boxing. "I'll fight anybody in the world," he said. "I'd like to meet George Chualo first. I think he is strong." Of former heavyweight titlist Floyd Patterson, he said, "I don't think Patterson can take a punch."

"The last five or six years," he said, "all of the title contenders as well as heavyweight champions have been colored."

There should be some white heavyweights in Europe as well as in this country who could provide a challenge for me or any heavyweight who becomes a champion.

TOP SLOW TO BE FIXER

Referring to Liston's performance Thursday, he said: "Sonny is too dull and too slow to be a fixer in a fight."

Besides, he added, if the fight had been fixed, Liston would have "waited more than one round to make it look good."

"I hit him flush with all of my 206 pounds and they hated to give me credit," Clay said.

"Television can't show how solid a punch is thrown, as I did against Liston."

Clay also had a complaint about taxes and a suggestion about the ticket scale for his next fight.

"Taxes are eating up too much of my ring earnings," he said. "That's why I'd like to box three times a year."

And on tickets, "I believe the price range should be lowered so that anyone and everyone could buy tickets."

CAHA Is Searching For 'Better Deal' From NHL

VICTORIA (CP)—The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association wants a "better deal" with the National Hockey League, ending team sponsorship and bringing in a universal draft system.

The CAHA annual meeting made it a unanimous vote here Thursday in deciding to end its working agreement with the NHL.

Whether the agreement is terminated immediately depends on the NHL, said CAHA president Lionel Fleury. Under a notice of termination clause the NHL could hold the CAHA to the agreement for two more years.

The agreement, signed in 1958, was due to expire in 1968. Main reason for the termination was a section providing for NHL sponsorship of amateur teams.

Fleury said the CAHA wants to stop this "funneling off of young talent" by adopting a draft for over-age juniors.

He said the sponsorship system is weakening amateur hockey by putting top players and large amounts of money into a few organizations and ignoring the rest.

The NHL sponsors almost 100 per cent of junior "A" teams in Canada, and hundreds of minor teams are affiliated through the Junior organizations, said Fleury.

He said that if the NHL agreed to withdraw sponsorship under terms of a new agreement, there would be little or no reduction in the number of amateur hockey teams.

"There would be other people interested in running the teams."

WOULD SHARE PAYMENTS

The CAHA proposes draft payments from the NHL to be distributed to amateur teams across Canada by an administrative committee of amateur and professional representatives.

Gordon Jukes, CAHA secretary-manager, said "the present system dumps a glob of financial assistance in certain places and ignores others."

He said termination came after a winter of futile negotiations with the NHL, aimed at writing changes into the present agreement.

"The more we discuss, the more we find ourselves and the pros going in opposite directions," said Jukes. "We do not feel any purpose can be served in further negotiations with the NHL."

The CAHA is also dissatisfied with other financial aspects of the agreement, said Fleury. It disagrees with a section limiting to 10 per cent the CAHA share of junior Memorial and senior Allan Cup national championship playoff gates.

DEFY AGREEMENT

The CAHA—in defiance of the agreement—increased its share to 15 per cent Wednesday. "to combat mounting expenses and a continuing deficit."

Jukes said this could be considered a test case to get the NHL to agree to termination of the agreement.

Fleury said he could not estimate how much money the NHL spends annually in team sponsorships.

Frank Boucher, commissioner of the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League, said in the SJHL each team would receive a minimum of \$5,000 a year. If sponsorship was dropped without any alternative source of funds for amateur teams "our league would not be able to survive."

"If teams received sufficient draft sums for developed players it would work just as well."

Dr. Leo Margolis, president of the British Columbia Amateur Hockey Association said: "In terminating the agreement the CAHA may finally become masters in their own house."
