Contract At S'side Airport Near Completion
A million dollar contract is just about completed at the Summerside R. C. A. F. station and by the end of the week it should be entirely wound up. On August 18, 1949, Bayside Construction Co. Ltd. of Campbellton, N. B., started construction of 150 housing units for the Air Force personnel and now just about a year later the job is about done. All of the houses have been turned over to the Air Force and have been occupied. At present there are only seven or eight men employed fixing up odds and ends and they should finish on Saturday. At the peak of employment over 300 men were given work including those employed by the sub-contractors. The units are divided into three types: Ninety-nine for airmen and N. C. O.'s; 42 for senior N. C. O.'s and junior officers and nine for senior officers. The area is now known as Slenson Park after air Vice Marshal Slenson, who formally opened it last December. Although this contract is about finished there is still a great deal of work being done. Gomac Construction Co. Ltd. of New Glasgow, N. S. this spring commenced a contract for the erection of a further 105 units and when these are completed Slenson Park will have more houses than many small towns. M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. are erecting a school for the children living there and Curran and Briggs Ltd. are grading the street and making the water and sewerage installations.—S.

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The fate was determined that his trip should be an eventful one because it started off by his ship going aground and he came home on the tail end of a hurricane and just ahead of a possible railroad strike.

When Mr. Weston was a member of Parliament in Britain during the war he had promised that as soon as shipping was available he would send fifty British boys on a good-will holiday in Canada. This was done in 1949 and was so successful that Mr. Weston expanded his idea this year for fifty more Britons to come to Canada for fifty Canadian boys to visit Britain.

The boys in Canada were chosen by the Y. M. C. A. for qualities of cooperation and good citizenship and for the ability to absorb what they would see. From this Province besides Ronald Leard of Summerside was also Robert Nelson of Charlottetown.

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They were not even allowed to take any clothing with them but they recovered their luggage the next day. Arrangements were then made to fly them to Britain and two days later they took off from Montreal's Dorval Airport in two parties. Ronald travelled on a British Overseas Airways strato-cruiser and before reaching London, one engine conked out and they landed on three engines. He passed over this experience lightly saying "there was nothing to it" but the official booklet of the trip describes it as a "hair-raising experience."

From London they went by Portsmouth and had a wonderful day with the Royal Navy, visiting H.M.S. Victory and going to sea with a flotilla of motor torpedo boats. At 40 knots the boats overtook and "buzzed" the liner Mauretania.

Ronald has a diary recording all the places he visited and the things he saw. He found the people friendly and easy to meet and for the most part apprehensive of the international situation although there was no more discussion about the possibility of war than there is in Canada.

A lighter side of their trip included several visits to the theatre and the Barbara Ann Scott show, "Rose Marie". Among the Canadian boys were two from Newfoundland, one from the Yukon and one from the North-West Territories. There were seven boys from Quebec, three of whom could not speak English when the trip started but by the time they arrived home they could carry on a conversation quite easily.—S.
