City Red Cross Drive Chairmen

The appointment of Brigadier G. G. K. Peake as General Chairman of the Red Cross Campaign in Charlottetown, and Mr. Frank A. MacKenzie as Chairman of Special Names for the City, completes the overall set-up of the Counties for the 1955 Red Cross Campaign. Brigadier Peake has associated with him Major O. R. Simons, who has played an important part in the Charlottetown Red Cross Campaign during the past few years. Together they have already started to contact Division Commanders whose names will be announced in the near future. Mr. Frank MacKenzie has also started to construct the personnel of his Special Names' Committee which is largely drawn from members of the Rotary Club of Charlottetown.

Cash System For Payment Of Unemployment Benefits

This week a new method of paying Unemployment Insurance benefits will be started at the National Employment Office in Charlottetown. Applicants of the city, and those living nearby, who are now paid by warrant over the local office counter, will henceforth be paid by cash. The actual payment will probably take place on Wednesday.

The adoption of the cash system involves certain re-arrangements of procedure in which the staff has been drilled for some days. Staff training sessions, which are part of the daily routine in all National Employment offices, have recently been spent on the new system. To complete the training, Mr. Stewart Buchanan of the Regional Unemployment Insurance treasury office in Moncton will arrive in Charlottetown today. He will also assist in getting the new system under way.

Mr. Buchanan lived in Charlottetown several years as a youth, and his mother was born in this Province.

Two Sackville Entries Sweep Drama Festival

MONCTON (CP) — Two entries from Sackville, N.B., made a clean sweep of the five awards for production and acting ability in the New Brunswick regional drama festival which concluded here Saturday night.

After a study of four plays, British adjudicator Andre Van Gysegem gave the highest rating to "Ladies in Retirement," Sackville Theatre Guild's first attempt at festival competition.

The play, written by Reginald Denham and Edward Percy, was directed by Robert Watt, a veteran of the British professional and Montreal repertory theatres.

BEST ACTRESS

Eileen Cuthbertson won the best actress award for her "feeling, audience-holding" portrayal of Ellen Creed in "Ladies."

The best actor award went to James Peddie for his portrayal of Tegeus in the Christopher Fry play "A Phoenix Too Frequent," Mount Allison University's Players' Society's entry. The adjudicator congratulated Peddie on his voice production.

After the final adjudication Mr. Watt received the Calvert New Brunswick regional trophy, the Calvert \$100 cheque and the McLaren cup on behalf of the Sackville guild.

PAID TRIBUTE FOR EFFORT

In announcing the awards Mr. Van Gysegem paid tribute to "those who had chosen difficult plays but didn't quite bring them off. He said the importance lay in the doing...not in the winning."

He gave Mount Allison of Sackville, and the University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, particular mention for the challenge offered by the plays they picked. UNB presented "Antigone."

Saturday afternoon, Mr. Van Gysegem complimented the Mount Allison group for a "gallant attempt" at "one of the wittiest of modern comedies."

CAPEURED SPIRIT

He said "A Phoenix Too Frequent" was "a play well worth doing" and the Mt. A. group had captured "quite a lot of the spirit of the play."

However, he said, the production lacked imagination, inventiveness, movement, was too static and didn't show the relish for words typical of Fry's work, his "contrasting of flights of poetry with the colloquial."

NAUWIGEAUW, N. B. (CP) — Mrs. Mary Emma Bennett, 86, mother of Hon. W. A. C. Bennett, premier of British Columbia, died here early Sunday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. William A. Macaulay.

The widow of Andrew H. Bennett was born at Murray Corner, in Westmorland county, a descendant of the first Scottish settlers in New Brunswick. She lived at Hampton 14 years, moved to Alberta and returned to New Brunswick after her husband died in 1935.

Mrs. Bennett is survived by three daughters: Mrs. Macaulay, Mrs. Frank O. Barner, Miami, Fla., and Mrs. George Drysdale, Edmonton; two sons, Russell T. Burns, Drake, Sask.; seven grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Fresh Talk Of Neutralizing Formosa Heard

LONDON (AP) — Fresh talk of neutralizing Formosa by placing Chinese Nationalist-held island under the wing of the United Nations was heard in Britain Sunday. Sections of the press of varying political shades made the suggestion-asking only whether the timing was right. It is not a new idea and has been shunned by the Chinese Reds many times in the past.

There have been indications of diplomatic manoeuvres aimed at bringing a cease-fire between the Chinese Communists and Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalists.

The pro-Labor Sunday Pictorial, without giving the source of its information, says:

"Sir Anthony Eden has a plan to make Formosa an independent state under UN trusteeship, with Chiang's government remaining as a sort of custodian for the UN."

The Conservative Sunday Dispatch, referring to possible negotiations for a cease-fire, says:

"An informal get-together of all concerned behind the scenes at the UN might be one solution, with the aim of neutralizing Formosa by placing it under the UN trusteeship."

The Observer, an influential independent Sunday newspaper, senses a change in Washington's attitude and says editorially: "months of American administration has evidently made up its mind that the armed conflict between Communist China and Formosa is a dangerous nuisance, to be ended as soon as opportunity offers; the earlier idea that Formosa might one day become a starting point for successful counter-revolution on the mainland has been abandoned."

The Times' Washington correspondent says in a dispatch: "It now is certain that New Zealand will ask the Security Council to call on both sides within the next few days to halt the fighting in Formosa strait and arrange for negotiations."
