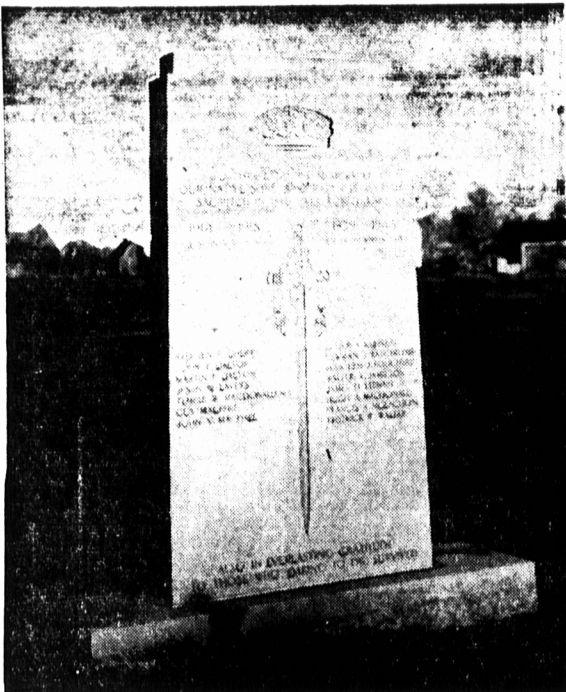


Georgetown War Memorial

U.S. President

Vincent Massey gave a state dinner in honor of the President. About 100 guests attended and were joined by another 200 for the reception afterwards. The President's two-day visit to Canada started at the Quebec border shortly after dawn. His special train was 35 minutes late when it arrived there and 15 minutes behind schedule when it pulled into union station here. Wearing a dark coat, striped pants, white silk scarf and homburg, the President was greeted by Mr. Massey, Prime Minister St. Laurent, cabinet ministers and the chiefs of the armed forces.

Mrs. Eisenhower, wearing a fur cape, dark suit, green velvet hat with matching gloves and pumps and pearl necklace and earrings, was presented with a bouquet by Mrs. St. Laurent who was wearing a broad-tailed fur cape, black dress and black hat. Defence Minister Claxton told the president he was glad to see him in his "third job." Mr. Eisenhower visited here in 1946 as U.S. Army chief of staff and again in 1951 as supreme commander, Allied powers in Europe.

When Trade Minister Howe was introduced to him, the President said: "There's hardly a day goes by but that I don't hear your name."

With Bowed Head

The formalities included inspecting two 100-man guards of honor, one composed of sailors, soldiers and airmen and the other of Canadian veterans, and placing a wreath of red carnations and white chrysanthemums on the national war memorial. The President placed the wreath among the hundreds put there Wednesday during the Remembrance Day ceremony. He stood with bowed head while the band played "Abide With Me."

Then he and Mrs. Eisenhower drove to Rideau Hall with Mr. Massey. The President stood in the open car and waved at cheering people at an intersection during the 10-minute drive. In the House of Commons later, Mr. St. Laurent referred to the President as a man "who has meant so much to the free nations of the world."

Trade Relations

The President will arrive at the Parliament buildings today at 10:45 a.m. EST. Mr. St. Laurent will make an introductory speech in the Commons before the President makes his 15-minute address. After the address, the President will confer with the cabinet for about an hour. In both the speech and the talk with the ministers, the President will discuss problems common to both countries. This is taken to mean chiefly trade relations and continental defence, though in the discussion with the cabinet the talk is expected to

Former Islander Dies in Alberta

Mr. Silas J. LeLacheur 64, of Edmonton, Alberta, died at his home there Monday following a lengthy illness.

Mr. LeLacheur was born at Gurnsey Cove, P.E. Island and went to Western Canada 47 years ago. He was a partner in the Western Transfer and Storage for 23 years before his retirement in 1947. He was a member of Lodge No. 91, A.F. and A.M.
