Candidate Blasts PC's Pension Ad

Queen's County Liberal candidate, B. B. Jones of Lunenburg, made two main points in addressing a public meeting at Winsloe last night.

Mr. Jones emphasized the "remarkable improvement in the Liberal party standing" as revealed in the latest Gallup poll results.

"The poll shows", he said, "that the Liberals are now riding with 50 per cent of the decided vote as against 32 per cent at this time in the 1962 election, while the Conservative position has deteriorated from 35 per cent in 1962 to 16 per cent as of yesterday's report."

"The trend varies somewhat from area to area", he said, "but in the Maritime provinces, as in the rest of Canada, the swing is most decidedly in favor of the Liberals."

Mr. MacGuigan in his speech pointed out that "national prosperity does not necessarily mean local prosperity."

"We have to work for local prosperity", he said, "no hand-outs from Ottawa will take the place of a locally flourishing economy. I am sure that with a solid Liberal representation from the Island in the next parliament, we can persuade Ottawa to give us the assistance that is needed to get worthwhile Island projects underway."

In this connection, he mentioned, that when Transport Minister Pickersgill was here last week, he and Mr. Jones had taken the minister on a tour of the Charlottetown waterfront, and that the minister had been "most impressed with the possibility and the need of providing adequate facilities" for ship repairs in this port.

CITY DRYDOCK

"The result of our tour of inspection", said Mr. MacGuigan, "was that the very next day, W. J. Kirk of the Department of Transport, came to Charlottetown to look over existing facilities at the Bruce Stewarts site. He was sufficiently impressed to advise us that Dr. Ernest Weeks, executive secretary of the Atlantic Development Board, will make a special trip to Charlottetown later this month, to study and report on the feasibility of providing drydock facilities at Charlottetown."

A highlight of last night's meeting was a pointed reference by Mr. Jones to a display advertisement published in the local papers this week by the Conservatives. Said Mr. Jones:

"The other day a mysterious figure by the name of John Jones appeared in a large P.E.I. Conservative association advertisement. I assure you, that the said gentleman is no relation of mine although I would not regret it if he were. According to the advertisement, John Jones, who is now 60 and earning \$3,000 a year, will, under the Canada Pension Plan, receive a lifetime pension of \$31.25 a month at age 65."

"The ad says that during this time, Mr. Jones will have paid into the plan at the rate of \$3.60 a month. That figures out, at a premium of \$43.20 a year, so that if John Jones paid the full premium himself, which would not necessarily be the case if his employer paid part of the

Among matters brought up was the present purchase by the city of an area of land in Spry Park and the purchase of the Charlottetown Sports Arena.

It was suggested that the city would need taxes from a 500-acre industrial program or a population of 150,000 property owners to offset expenditures of the city.

The question was asked whether the provincial government was making compensation for the loss of properties appropriated to make way for the new provincial building.

The meeting adjourned after a motion that two members of the executive and as many other representatives of the association as possible attend each city council meeting.

Ship Unloads 5,000 Tons

The Carina, a large fertilizer ship, is unloading 5,000 tons of fertilizer for Island Fertilizers Inc.

The ship, Liberian registry, docked at the railway wharf and is being unloaded by two working crews of 50 men working day and night.

A spokesman for Island Fertilizers Inc., last night said the ship is expected to leave by the latter part of next week with a cargo of Island potatoes bound for the Southern United States.

Her cargo of fertilizer taken on in Virginia is being handled by agents for the ship, Buntain Bell Co.
