A MEDICAL JOURNAL FOR THE PROVINCES.—Says the Halifax Chronicle: Halifax is soon to have a new journal, to be published in the interest of the medical profession of the Maritime Provinces. It will be issued bi-monthly, the first number coming out in November. Each province is to be represented on the editorial staff by two members of the profession, the Halifax editors being Drs. Campbell and Morrow. There is a good field for such a journal and its appearance will doubtless be hailed with satisfaction by the medical men.

WRECK.—The schooner Vixen, Captain Shiner, with a cargo of coal for the Island railway, sprang a leak, off Belle Creek, on Thursday, and had to be run ashore on the south side of Point Prim at nine o'clock at night in order to save the lives of those on board. After springing a leak, the Captain tried hard to make Charlottetown, but the pumps gave out, and she made water so fast that she had to be run ashore as above stated. The wind was blowing very hard at the time, and the crew had a narrow escape. They saved little or nothing. Neither vessel nor cargo were insured.

Rev. B. B. Keefer, who is to lecture on the "Repeal of the Scott Act," in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, on Tuesday evening next, arrived here last evening, and is registered at the Davies. Poisoned With Chocolate Drops.

TORONTO, Oct. 5.

Great excitement was caused here to-day when it became known that two children of Rev. John Cherry, of Galt, Ont., had died yesterday by eating poisoned chocolate drops, sent through the post office from Toronto addressed to his wife. Packages were also received by twelve other families, but fortunately before they had tasted the poisonous drops, they heard of the death of Mr. Cherry's children. The drops contained strychnine. There were no marks on the packages to indicate who the senders were.

This morning, a similar package containing chocolate drops, addressed A. S. McKay, Pictou, Nova Scotia, was seized in the post office here, and handed over to the police authorities. What the motive is, or who the fiend is, remains a complete mystery.

The Whitechapel Murders.

LONDON, Oct. 5.

Sir Charles Warren, chief of the metropolitan police force, has decided to employ blood hounds in his efforts to discover the perpetrator of the Whitechapel murders. The police place great confidence in the story of George M. Dodge, seaman, who states that in August he met a Malay cook named Alaska, with whom he had previously been acquainted, in a music hall in London, and Alaska told him he had been robbed of all he had by a woman of the town, and he threatened that unless he found the woman and recovered his property he would kill and mutilate every Whitechapel woman he met. The police are searching everywhere for the Malay.

Late Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 5.

Mr. Reid, of Caribou, has been appointed to the Senate vice Mr. Nelson. It is stated that his constituency will be contested for the Commons by Francis Barnard, whose father was formerly a representative from that province.

November 15th has been selected as Thanksgiving Day. The net debt of the Dominion decreased a million and a quarter dollars during September.

Chinese Laborers.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.

The Collector of Customs at Port Townsend, Ore., reports by telegraph to the Treasury Department that Chinese laborers are arriving from British Columbia with proper return certificates, and asks if they shall be allowed to land. Assistant-Secretary Maynard answered him by telegraph to-day, sending him the provisions of the Chinese Exclusion Bill, and saying that it went into effect on the date of its approval by the President, October 1st.

Great Naval Display.

HALIFAX, Oct. 2.

Wednesday next will be a gala day here. The seven war ships now in port go out on Tuesday evening, and on Wednesday morning 2,500 marines and sailors will endeavor to effect a landing at some vulnerable point. All the militia and regulars will be under arms at 3 o'clock in the morning, and will be sent to oppose the invaders. It is estimated that 8,000 men will take part in the mock battle. Sir John Ross will be in command of the troops.

Fatal Accident.

HALIFAX, Oct. 5.

To-day while Clark Caldwell, a contractor, was sitting on the top staging of the Church of England Institute, the staging gave way and he fell on a pile of brick, and was killed instantly. Caldwell was a respectable citizen, aged 55 years, and was a member of the firm of Johnston & Caldwell.

That Settles It.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 5.

Senator Canada, referring to the annexation of Canada, said to-day:—"I consider that it is only a question of time till Canada is part of the United States. Whether it be one year or ten, Canada will undoubtedly be annexed."

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 5.

The bulletin for the 24 hours ending at 6 p. m. is: New cases, 52; deaths, 6; total cases, 3,022; total deaths, 277.

Rebels captured.

SUAKIM, Oct. 5.

The rebels made an attack on this place last night, but were repulsed by the heavy fire of the British troops.

Smallpox in Toronto.

TORONTO, Oct. 5.

Two cases of smallpox have been discovered here, and ten physicians started out to make a house to house vaccination.

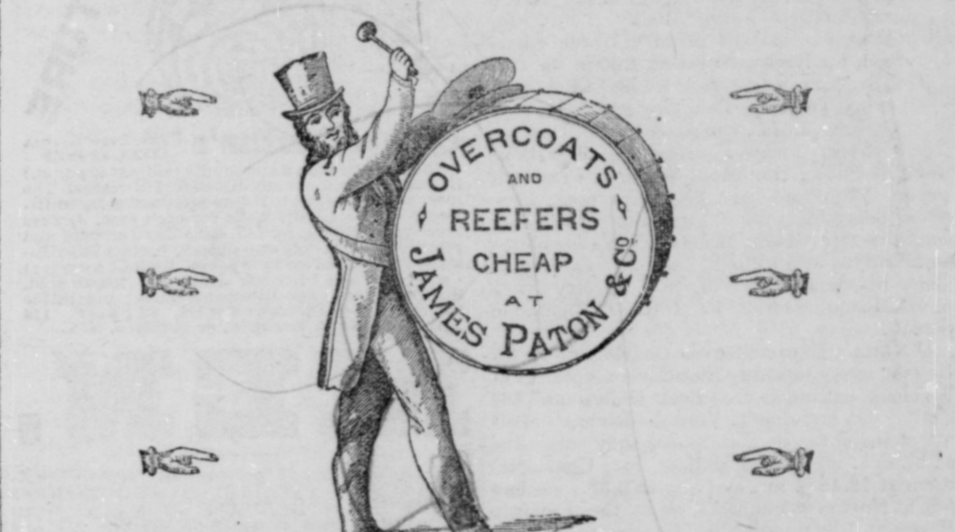
