To Place Five-Foot Culvert Under Grafton Street East

At a special meeting yesterday morning the City Council decided to go ahead with the placing of a five-foot culvert under Grafton Street east to replace the inadequate two-foot culvert now located there.

Coun. Storey explained that the inadequate culvert caused a bottleneck situation when the flow of surface water became excessive.

The new five-foot cement culvert is now en route from Saint John, N.B., where it was processed in readiness for the job and will be placed in position by city employees, supplemented when necessary by specialized equipment.

In order to expedite the completion of the job, alternate routing of traffic must be resorted to, without however any unnecessary inconvenience to the travelling public.

The possibility of an impediment to this flow still remains however, according to the report of the Street Committee, but in this case the fault would lie in that portion of the drainage system which passes through the area reclaimed by the Canadian National Railway south of the Green Bridge.
