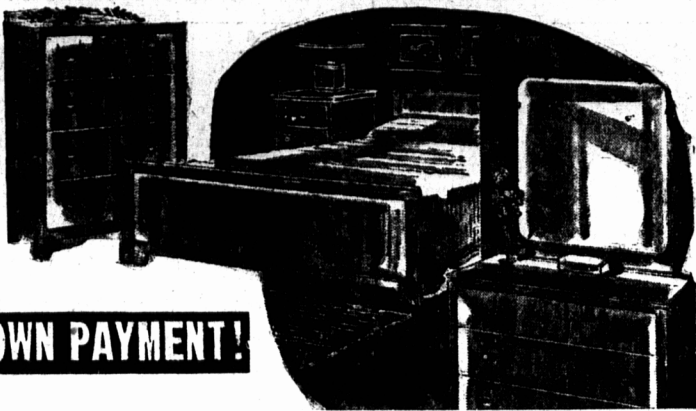


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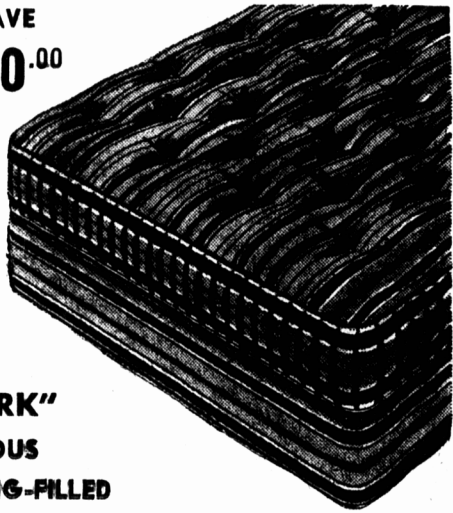
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Emergency Measure Passed By Deputies In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—Peronistas rapped President Juan D. Peron's bill for a state of siege in Buenos Aires through the House of Deputies in a rowdy two-hour session late Thursday.

The vote was 109 to 12. The drastic emergency measure then went to the all-Peronista Senate for quick approval. The overpowering Peronista majority members of the House jumped to their feet twice to cheer and applaud wildly.

A state of siege would give Peron forces extraordinary powers such as arrest and punishment of alleged trouble-makers on the spot.

SAYS POWER NEEDED

Peron said he needs the powers to deal more effectively with his political enemies. He spelled out these powers to a wildly cheering throng in the central Plaza de Mayo Wednesday night when he withdrew an earlier offer to resign.

He told his well-organized followers to "annihilate and crush" the enemy, and added:

"We have to answer violence with greater violence . . . when one of our people falls, five of them will fall . . . from now on . . . he who in any place tries to disturb order . . . contrary to the law or the constitution may be slain by any Argentinian."

The siege bill was introduced by Peronista floor leader Oscar Bidegain, who said:

"A nucleus of oligarchs in the federal capital is directing permanent attacks against the people and the authorities with terrorism, revolution and crime."

TROUBLE SINCE 1951

Peron clamped a state of siege on the entire country for 13 days after the unsuccessful June 16 revolt. Argentina has been under a state of internal war since September, 1951, when a band of military men staged another unsuccessful revolt to oust Peron.

Constitutional guarantees have been suspended since then and Peron has wielded special powers. A state of siege will give him even greater powers.

The Chamber of Deputies debate opened with an uproar from the opposition, but Peronistas drowned it out with an even greater tumult.

Santiago Carlos Fassi, Radical party deputy for the federal capital, shouted that Peron's speech in the Plaza de Mayo was designed to "incite to crime and destruction."

DROWNED OUT

Peronistas jumped to their feet and drowned out the rest of Fassi's remarks with a chorus of cheers.

Bidegain said it would not be necessary to apply the state of

siege to areas outside the capital city because "the rest of the country lives in peace."

As he spoke, reports of sporadic violence outside Buenos Aires continued to pour in.

A provincial deputy was wounded when demonstrators fired on his party's headquarters. Three opposition newspapers were wrecked. A mob fired on the Radical party building at Posadas, capital of Misiones province, wounding a Radical provincial deputy.

Riots have been erupting throughout Argentina for several weeks, part of Peron's running fight with student organizations and supporters of the Roman Catholic Church.

3,000 CHINESE REVOLT
TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—The official Nationalist Chinese news agency claimed Tuesday that more than 3,000 persons are in active revolt in the northwestern areas of Hunan province on the Communist Chinese mainland. The report came from the ministry of interior's Taitao agency, which claims underground contacts.
