Chicago Ends Dodgers Winning Streak; Indians Shade Yankees 4-3; Red Sox Win

The Chicago Cubs pulled out Brooklyn's favorite weapon—the home run—to crack the Dodgers' 11-game National League winning streak 10-8 Wednesday at Wrigley Field in Chicago.

Ernie Banks hit a grand-slam homer and Dee Fondy hit one good for three runs to hand the fast-starting Dodgers their third defeat in 25 games. The two previous Brooklyn defeats were by the margin of one run.

While Brooklyn hit a temporary snag, Cleveland Indians won their second straight from New York Yankees at Yankee Stadium 4-3, increasing their American League lead to three full games over the second-place Chicago White Sox.

The White Sox were nipped 4-3 by Boston Red Sox, who apparently were inspired by news that Ted Williams would rejoin them Friday. Billy Klaus' two-run homer in the seventh and sharp relief pitching by Ellis Kinder accounted for the Red Sox victory, halting a five-game losing streak.

TIGERS BLANK NATS

The Yankees fell into a tie for third place, four games off the pace, with Detroit Tigers, who shut out Washington Senators 7-0 on Ned Garver's three-hit pitching. In the only other American League game, Kansas City Athletics blanked Baltimore Orioles 2-0 with Alex Kellner and reliever Bobby Shantz sharing a five-hit mound performance.

In the only other daytime National League game, Milwaukee Braves broke the Pittsburgh Pirates' 10-game winning streak by beating them 3-2 with Ed Matthews blasting a home run in the third with two mates on base.

New York Giants played Cincinnati and Philadelphia met St. Louis in night games.

Speedballer Bob Turley, who had won five straight for the Yankees, was a victim of wildness and the Indians prevailed on a three-run spurge in the fourth inning.

The Indians collected only three hits but Turley gave up seven walks through the first four innings. Early Wynn was the winner on a five-hit performance although he yielded home runs to Andy Carey and Mickey Mantle.

At Boston, Kinder relieved winning pitcher Frank Sullivan in the ninth after the latter had given up a walk and a single. He forced George Kell to pop up with the winning run on base. Klaus' home run, a two-run shot in the seventh, was his first in the majors.

Baltimore's Lon Kretlow pitched well against the Athletics but his mates were held to five scattered singles by starter Kellner and Shantz, who relieved in the fourth when Kellner developed a kink in his back.

Garver played a dual role of both stand-out pitcher and hitter for Detroit. He not only gave up just three hits, but figured in five runs scored by the Tigers, driving in two of them. Al Kaline snatched his seventh homer of the season in the ninth of Frank Shea, who had relieved loser Dean Stone.

Chicago Cubs, in beating Brooklyn, also broke an old jinx, beating Russ Meyer, who had whipped them 17 straight. Meyer lasted only one inning as the Cubs piled up five runs. It was the first Dodger setback since April 24 when they lost a 10-inning decision to the Giants.

Banks hit his grand-slammer in the first and Fondy poked his homer in the third off Clem Labine, second of Brooklyn's six pitchers. Jim Davis, who relieved John Andre, was credited with the victory.

Matthews, with his three-run homer, and Joe Adcock, who had two doubles and a single, were the big guns for Milwaukee, which had dropped four straight to the Pirates. Chet Nichols won his third game of the season for Milwaukee giving up eight hits and starting two double-plays. Ron Kline was the loser.

Ted Williams With Troubles Settled To Report On Friday

BOSTON (AP)—Ted Williams, one of baseball's all time great hitters, ended his retirement Wednesday with a phone call to the Boston Red Sox that he would arrive Friday.

Williams called general manager Joe Cronin from Miami where the final settlement of his divorce was recorded Wednesday morning. "I'm not going to wait any longer," Ted told Cronin. I've spent two days with my daughter. I'd made up my mind to play baseball again before the settlement was completed."

Although Williams never has explained his decision of last year to quit baseball, friends said his marital difficulties were the principal reason.

Athletics Buy Pitcher

BALTIMORE, Md., (AP)—Kansas City Athletics, seeking desperately for pitching strength, bought righthander Ray Herbert from Detroit Tigers Wednesday.

Purchase price was not announced, but personnel manager Ray Kennedy of the Athletics said it was "a lot of money." The Athletics also recalled Herbert Lopez, promising second baseman, from Columbus of the International League and sent Forrest Spook Jacobs down to the Ohio club in return.

Earlier Wednesday the Tigers released veteran utility man Steve Souchock and infielder Ron Sanford. Souchock was sent to the Tigers' Buffalo farm club in the International League.

Former Cricket Player Dies

DORCHESTER, Eng., (Reuters)—Gilbert L. Jessop, famous former English cricket player, died at nearby Fordington Rectory, Wednesday. He would have been 51 next week.

Jessop, who captained Gloucestershire for many years early in the century, was known as "The Croucher" because of his stance at the wicket.

One of the game's biggest hitters, his name was a byword with cricket fans. It used to be said that when word got around Britton's business district that Jessop was due at the wicket, workers left their jobs in a hurry to see the great slugger. He frequently scored at the rate of more than a run a minute.

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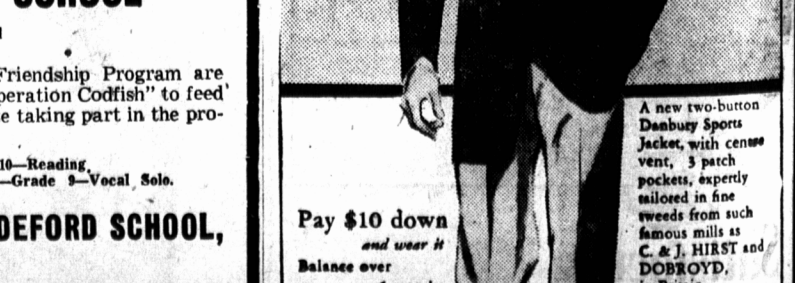
