Egyptianization Is Keynote Of Nassar's Internal Policy

Editor's note: This dispatch is by an Associated Press correspondent who has just arrived in Rome from Cairo, where he was stationed during the British-French landing in Egypt. Egyptian censorship prevented transmission of this revealing dispatch from Egypt.

ROME (AP)—An Egyptian policeman rolled down the shutters of a French bookstore in the heart of Cairo one day soon after the British-French assault on Egypt began. It symbolized one way the attack on Egypt has backfired on the British and French in a country where their influence has been dominant for decades.

"Egyptianization" is the new watchword of President Nassar's regime. Behind the headlines about Port Said and the UN emergency
