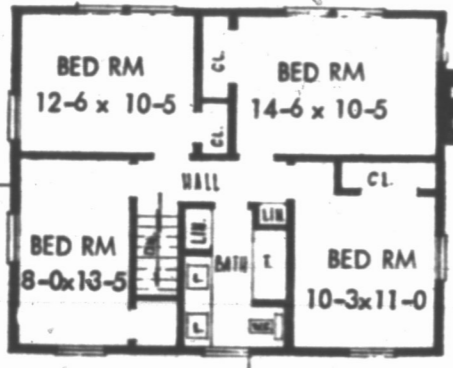

## Area Development Suggestions Made

ALBERTON — The rural development workshop continued yesterday in Alberton with Alec Sims, Ottawa, and Rudy Dalenback, ARDA fieldman, in charge of both morning and afternoon sessions in the Alberton Regional High School.

The 40 people in attendance were divided into six groups and some concrete plans on the needs of the area were presented from the different groups.

On tourism it was suggested, a second national park and the establishment of the West Point ferry service to the mainland are urgently needed. Also more accommodation and special services for tourists are to be attracted to the area.

The need for an all weather highway to Tignish was another topic.

Congratulating the Tignish Arts Foundation the committee asked that handicrafts be made available to the people of the area.

The report on the potato situation was that a large warehouse be made available possibly in the O'Leary area, for holding at least two carloads of potatoes. A survey was suggested to ascertain the feasibility of a potato processing plant. If successful expansion into livestock is to be attained in the area it is recommended that a feeding lot be set up.

Capital spending is estimated at \$42.8 million compared to \$41.5 million in 1964. This total is broken down into construction expenditures of \$27.2 million

against \$26.2 and machinery and equipment spending of \$15.6 million compared to \$15.3 million.

Repair expenditures are expected to total \$12 million, broken down into construction repair of \$8.2 million against \$7.9 million and machinery and equipment spending of \$3.4 million compared to \$4.9 million.

The totals of both capital and repair spending show \$33.4 million to be spent on construction and \$21 million on machinery and equipment, compared to 1964 totals of \$34.1 million and \$20.3 million.

### Capital Expenditures Here Increase Expected In '65

OTTAWA (Special) — The department of trade and commerce revealed yesterday that capital and repair expenditures in Prince Edward Island are expected to increase slightly in 1965 over last year's private and public investment.

Trade Minister Mitchell Sharp tabled the annual forecast of capital spending in Canada in the Commons and it showed that spending in PEI should reach a total of \$56.4 million compared to \$54.3 million last year and \$36.3 million in 1963.

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Island estimates show the biggest drop in trade, finance and

commercial services which show a total of \$6.5 million compared to \$8.8 million last year. But more than making up for this drop is an increase in housing, institutional services and government departments which are expected to spend some \$30.7 million this year as compared to \$25.9 million in 1964.

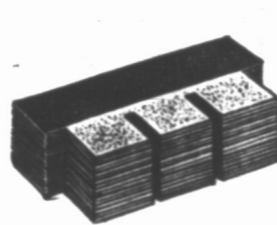

### Margarine Regulations Are Passed In Principle

Specific regulations concerning the sale of margarine were laid down when the Margarine Act got second reading in the Legislature yesterday morning. Inspectors were given a wide range of authority to enter stores, warehouses, trucks, cars, or wherever margarine is stored or transferred.

Other regulations laid down state margarine may be either lighter or darker than the specified color range of butter - but not within the same range. It may not be sold containing preservatives other than salt or benzoic acid in specified amounts. It must not contain more than 16 per cent water by weight, nor less than 80 per cent fat by weight and the butterfat content may not exceed that contained in skim milk.

Contravention of the regulations can, upon summary conviction, result in fines up to \$500 or jailing for 60 days. The margarine package must be so marked, carry the trade name and the name and address of the manufacturer, names of ingredients and the percentage of each and the type of oil or fat.

No person shall be permitted to manufacture margarine in Prince Edward Island without first obtaining a license from the Minister of Agriculture.

Answering a question on this point Hon. A.B. MacRae, minister of agriculture, who promoted the bill, said he expected to issue such licenses.
