Would Benefit Starch Factories

Three P. E. I. starch factories which would benefit by Federal assistance as requested in an application made by the P. E. I. and New Brunswick Potato Marketing Boards are located at Hunter River, East Baltic, and Murray Harbour. These factories are ready to go into production but cannot do so without financial assistance. The decision to ask Ottawa for assistance was reached at a meeting of the two Boards in Fredericton early this week. It was decided to ask Ottawa to pay a small amount of assistance so that the starch manufacturers may be able to pay growers a price to meet world competition.

Debate On Draft Address Continued

The debate on the Draft Address in the Legislature was continued yesterday afternoon by Hon. F. A. Large, Minister of Education, Hon. Joseph Campbell, 3rd King's and Mr. George MacKay, 4th Prince. The prospect is that the debate will be concluded today. A bill to amend the Judicature Act was given second reading. The main amendment is the changing of the two regular sittings of the King's County Court in Georgetown from the last Tuesday in February and the last Tuesday in July to the second Tuesday of July and November respectively. Another amendment will change the date of the sittings of the Supreme Court for Appeal cases from the last Tuesday in April to the second Tuesday in May. Second reading was also given a bill by which the capital holdings of the Charlotte-town Council, Knights of Columbus, may be increased from \$5,000 to \$20,000. Bills to amend the following acts were given first readings: Children's Act, Town Act, Co-operative Associations Act, Highway Traffic Act, Fire Prevention Act, Temperance Act, Probate Act, Public Vehicles Act, Public Health Act, and Companies Act. First readings were also given to the following bills: Department of Industry and Natural Resources, Legislative and Public Library, and Director of Laboratories. The House adjourned until this afternoon at three o'clock. Adjournment of the Draft Address was moved by Hon. Eugene Cullen.

Fifth Canadian Casualty List

OTTAWA, March 14—(CP)—The Army today released its fifth casualty list for Korea, showing one man dead of wounds and four wounded, all of them other ranks. It raised the total to 73 casualties among the men of the 2nd Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. They include 18 dead, 50 wounded and five injured in battle accidents. Mrs. Pitre Testifies In Own Defence

QUEBEC, March 14—(CP)—Mrs. Arthur Pitre today told a criminal assizes jury she planned turning over to police the man who master-minded the time-bombing of an airliner, but was prevented by her brother who did it himself. Charged with murder in the elaborate plot that killed 23 people, Mrs. Pitre walked with their step to the witness stand to testify in her own defence. She said she planned to tell police to come and get J. Albert Guay at her home after he offered her two alternatives: suicide or face criminal charges. Mrs. Pitre will continue to testify tomorrow.

Somers, Charlottetown; Ordinary Steward William R. Grant, Souris; Stoker Mechanic Joseph A. Arsenault, Summerside; Stoker Mechanic Bennett F. Arsenault, Summerside; Ordinary Seaman Francis W. Westman, Borden, and Ordinary Steward Joseph L. Gauthier, Charlottetown. P.E.I. Entry In Running For Drama Finals

"Papa Is All," Prince Edward Island's entry in the Dominion Drama Festival, is listed among those in the running for participation in the finals. The local production, the work of the Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild, and directed by Vera Millar, is included among five plays selected from the Maritimes and Quebec Province by adjudicator Robert G. Newton for consideration as finalists. Others selected to date are "Glas Menagerie" by the Saint John Theatre Guild, New Brunswick; "Accent on Youth" by the Halifax Theatre Arts Guild, Nova Scotia; "Ma Petite Ville" by Les Compagnons de Notre-Dame de Trois-Rivieres, Eastern Quebec; and "Les Gueux Au Paradis" by Les Compagnons de St. Laurent, Western Quebec. With eight groups to be selected, entries are anxiously awaiting April 14th when Mr. Newton will meet with the executive committee of the Dominion Drama Festival in London, Ontario, to make a full report on his adjudication from his Canada-wide tour. The eight plays selected by the committee will be invited to London, Ontario, to compete in the finals from May 14 to 18.

Montreal Judge Passes At 80

MONTREAL, March 14—(CP)—Mr. Alfred Duranleau, K. C. for more than 15 years a judge of the Superior Court, died today at his home. He was in his 80th year. Funeral service will be held Saturday. Justice Duranleau was born in Farnham, Que. He studied law at Laval University and was admitted to the Bar in 1897 at Granby, Que. He was named King's Counsel in 1914. He was a member of the Quebec Legislature, Montreal-Laurier division, from 1923 to 1927. In 1930 he was elected member of Parliament for Chambly-Vercheres and served as Minister of Marine in the Bennett Cabinet from 1930 to 1935 when he was named a judge of the Superior Court.

Native Of City Dies In Quebec

Mr. J. F. Fraser, manager of the C. N. Telegraph Office received word last night of the death in Sherbrooke, Quebec, of his brother, Arthur R. Fraser. The late Mr. Fraser had been ill for some time, and the news of his passing was not unexpected. "Art" Fraser will be remembered by many old friends in this city where he was born 39 years ago, and where he was employed as a telegraph operator from 1906 to 1914. Later he worked for the F. B. McCurdy Brokerage firm in Halifax, before enlisting in the Navy as wireless man in World War I, after discharge by Johnson-Ward, brokers of Sherbrooke, Quebec and also by the Canadian Pacific Company in Montreal. For some years he has made his home in Sherbrooke. Following World War I he married an English nurse, Miss Ethel Taylor, who had served during the conflict. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Fraser both of whom died a few years ago. His wife, and two daughters survive him. They are Mrs. John Davey of Sherbrooke, and Betty at home. In addition to his brother in this city Mr. J. F. Fraser, one sister May, also survives.

Offshore Limit On Operation Of Dragers Urged

"We should urge the Department of Industry and Natural Resources to press upon the Dominion Government that a restriction be placed upon dragers from operating within three miles from shore," stated Mr. J. Brenton St. John, Liberal member for First Kings, speaking on the Draft Address in the Legislature yesterday. "They should also ask for a six mile limit in places like Basin Head and Murray Harbour," he added. "By inshore fishing the dragers would tend to minimize a great deal of lobster grounds and inshore fishing gear and also bring about the destruction of hake and cod in spawning shoals during June and July. "But I believe the dragers will help inshore fishermen. Through them we will be able to obtain much larger markets and hold them, something we have been unable to do in the past because we have not been able to secure a large enough supply." He presented figures which showed that King's County had led the Province in the value of fish catches during 1950, \$978,756 worth of fish were caught in King's County during the year in comparison with \$831,273 in Prince and \$552,776 in Queen's. "The value of the catch in King's County had increased last year by \$220,000 over the catch in 1949," he stated. "In comparison the value of the Prince County catch increased by slightly over \$59,000." County catches per cwt. he outlined as follows: Prince, 137,417; King's, 101,310; Queen's, 64,134. Speaking on education he noted that 28 out of 29 students in Souris had passed the Maritime Board Grade XI examinations last year. This, he stated, was the best showing of any locality in the Province and he doubted if any centre in the Maritimes could equal the record. He stated that a plan for a twelfth year instead of an eleventh year had been put before the Department of Education. This plan, he stated, was sound as many felt that most students were unfit to enter first year university after completing only Grade XI. Most centres would be ready for this new plan in two years, he felt. Souris definitely would be prepared for such a scheme for two years, he added. He understood that a hard surfacing road program for King's and Prince Counties were to be expanded and he hoped to see the highway from Souris to Elmira hard-surfaced in the near future. He commended the Departments of Agriculture, Health and Welfare for their work.

To Use Huge Planes As Transports

LONDON, March 14—(Reuters)—Three giant 100-passenger Princess flying boats which Britain is building at a cost of more than \$2,920,000 are to be used by the R. A. F. as transports, Air Minister Arthur Henderson said today. The planes are expected to cruise at about 350 miles an hour and to have a range of about 4,000 miles.

MONTREAL, March 14—(CP)—Price Brothers and Company Ltd., today reported a net profit of \$2,275,564 for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, compared with \$7,125,007 the previous year. Net profit is equal to \$4.12 per common share, compared with \$3.16 the preceding year. Current assets totalled \$26,964,213 against \$28,118,982 in 1949, while current liabilities amounted to \$9,391,717 against \$7,362,102.

Island Army officers leaving for the conference are Capt. M. E. Bernard, P.E.I. Regiment; Capt. A. E. Farquharson, 28th L.A.A. Regiment; Capt. J. L. Clarke, 21st Acmeured Brigade; Capt. D. D. Koss, 5th Signals Regiment; Officer Cadet S. B. Zinck, 28th L.A.A. Regiment; and Pay Sergeant Allan MacKay, P.E.I. Regiment. The local men are expected to return next Monday.

Stresses Need Of Dental Work

"Nine out of every ten children at West Kent School need dental work," said Dr. B. J. O'Meara of the Dental Division of the Department of Public Health and Welfare as he addressed the regular meeting of the West Kent Kent Parent-Teacher Home and School Association at West Kent School last evening. Dr. O'Meara pointed out this fact as he talked on the great apathy he had found in this Province toward the care of teeth. He continued by saying that among the six-year-old children, he had found an average of seven decayed teeth and one filled, in the mouth of each child. He stressed the need of preventive measures and spoke of the sodium fluoride treatments now being given to three-year-olds by the department. A feature of the well-attended meeting which was presided over by Mrs. J. P. Lantz, was the showing of a film, "Something to Chew on." A discussion was held on the discontinuance of the published monthly Honor Roll and the advisability of a Home and School newsletter. This subject was moved over to the next meeting for further discussion. The contest among the classes of West Kent for the largest number of parents attending the meeting was won by Miss Higgins' four year old pupils. Following the meeting refreshments were served by a committee under the convensership of Mrs. Ivan Horne and Mrs. H. W. Fletcher.

Stresses Need Of Better Roads And Electricity

Lack of hard surfaced roads and of electricity in certain areas were listed as two of the causes why young people were leaving the Province by Hon. Joseph Campbell, Minister without portfolio, during the debate on the draft address in the Legislature yesterday. He noted that people in a large section of King's County around Dundas and Annandale were not serviced by paved roads or the railways. Some of the people are as far away as 18 miles from these services and in winters such as this they are confronted with huge difficulties. He thought it would be safe to say that a paved road will be laid to Georgetown and Cardigan this year. This was not done last year because the road had to be conditioned and left to settle before the pavement could be laid, he stated. The people at Dundas and Annandale will not be satisfied to see the pavement stop at Cardigan, he added. With regard to electrical service, he thought that the lines between Fortune Bridge and Cardigan should be connected. The Montague bridge, Mr. Campbell stated, was not too safe for passage. It would be a wise move for the Department of Public Works to give it some attention.

Anti-Church Move Extended In China

HONG KONG, March 14—(AP)—Radio Peiping today indicated the Chinese Communists had extended their anti-church campaign to include parishioners as well as pastors. The Reds' official New China News Agency said authorities at Tientsin had arrested two Chinese Roman Catholic priests and 17 converts on charges of sabotaging Red China's campaign to divorce the Catholic Church from foreign missions. Under the Reds' recent purge regulations, conviction would be punishable by death.

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Quebec Legislature Is Prorogued

QUEBEC, March 14—(CP)—The Quebec Legislature's 1951 session was prorogued today by Lieutenant-Governor Gaspard Fautoux at 4:25 p.m., EST. The session, third of the 23rd Legislature, opened last Nov. 8, adjourned after a week's sittings and resumed Jan. 24. Legislation was concerned particularly with Quebec's industrial development. There were four projects for electric power development. Sixty-seven government bills and 83 private bills were passed by the two houses of the Legislature.
