British Woman Dies At Age 105

KIDDERMINSTER, England (Reuters)—Miss Jane Badland died Friday night at the age of 105 of an illness which began the day after she attended the funeral of her 102-year-old sister Caroline.

The two spinsters, Britain's only centenarian sisters, spent more than a century in each other's day-to-day company until Caroline's death 11 days ago.

They lived in the same house in this central England town for more than 90 years.

The sisters were members of the same church and the same societies. Until comparatively recently they went walking and shopping together.

They shared the same tastes and interests. Both were lifelong vegetarians and teetotallers.
