3rd. There was \$3,000 a year given to the poor. He would do away with that grant, and "if they did not like it, let them go to the poor-house."

4th. There was steam and packet service to various places. He would do away with the subsidies, and trust to private enterprise in this matter.

Dr. Jenkins made a vigorous onslaught on this policy, and in a very few words completely demolished it. He pointed out the manifest absurdity of the proposition to save \$15,000 of real money by giving the machines to the people.

Dr. Jenkins was not in the Government nor in the House a man, excepting Mr. Donald Farquharson, who was so utterly callous to all feelings of humanity as to listen for a moment to a proposal to rob the poor of the trifling pittance which they received, and even if the proposal should be carried out, it would be saving five dollars and spending a hundred by sending them to the Poorhouse.

He warned the Government against the considered meddling with the Education Act, which is now the most efficient in the whole Dominion and a source of pride as well as a great boon to the people. As to the abolishing of the subsidies given for steam and packet service, such a course would be a manifest injustice and a cause of grievous injury to the settlements where those boats now run, and would bring defeat to the candidates in favor of such a scheme.
