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Soviet Exports To N. Viet Nam Are Increased

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet non-military exports to North Viet Nam rose sharply last year to nearly \$75,000,000 while Vietnamese exports in payment slumped to \$30,500,000, it was disclosed in statistics published Saturday.

The Soviet 1965 trade statistics also show that Soviet exports to Communist China ended a long decline and rose 42 per cent from 1964. Imports from China continued to drop, but remained ahead of exports.

The Russians value the ruble at about \$1.20 in Canadian funds. MACHINES EXPORTED Two-thirds of Russia's non-military exports to North Viet Nam were machinery and equipment, much of it small items to round out the North Vietnamese economy. The \$75,000,000 total for 1965 compares with \$47,670,000 in 1964.

Soviet imports from North Viet Nam, which had been rising in recent years, dropped to \$30,500,000 from \$34,000,000 in 1964.

A North Vietnamese delegation led by Deputy Premier Le Thanh Nghi is now in Moscow seeking further expansion of economic co-operation and trade. This is believed to mean Hanoi wants more Russian aid.

The decline in Hanoi's 1964 shipments indicates the Viet Nam war is making it increasingly difficult for North Viet Nam to pay for needed items. Soviet exports to China in 1965 were valued at \$191,670,000 against \$135,300,000 in 1964.
