Husband Gets Life Sentence For Slaying

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—T. Eugene Thompson, found guilty of murder, was sentenced Friday night to a life term in prison. The verdict, by a jury of six men and six women, came nine months to the day after the bludgeen - knife slaying of Thompson's wife, Carol, 34. The jurors decided it had been engineered by the defendant. Judge Ruf J. Posseon commended jurors for their work. The judge asked whether Thompson had anything to tell the court. "No," answered the defendant and sentence was imposed. There was no indication when he might start to serve the life term. The six-week trial went to the jury about 4 p.m. Thursday.

MURDER FOR HIRE
The prosecution called Mrs. Thompson's death a murder-for-hire killing purchased by Thompson, 36, to reap more than \$1,000,000 in insurance on her life and to free him for romance with a twice-married secretary.

A bill raising the \$75 monthly pension for the aged, disabled and blind was introduced by Prime Minister Pearson. An Orthodox patriarch even suggested a summit meeting of all major Christian faiths while the Roman Catholic pontiff is in the Holy Land.

A Vatican press announcement Friday said Pope Paul VI would leave Rome Jan. 4, a Saturday, and return Jan. 6. This would mean a journey by plane, the first air trip for a pope, since Jerusalem is 1,500 miles away. The pope will be away from the Vatican for two nights and will celebrate at least two masses in the Holy Land. One will be on Jan. 6, the Roman Catholic feast of the Epiphany, the day of the infant Jesus in Bethlehem. The three-day schedule multiplied the problems of ingathering and security for those charged with caring for the 65-year-old spiritual head of 500,000,000 Roman Catholics.

MAY CROSS BORDER
It was assumed that he will cross the Israel-Jordan frontier, which is guarded by Israeli and Arab armies hostile to each other. Sources at Vatican City said a three-day trip—instead of the usual two-day pilgrimage that most church circles had expected—would give him time to meet with orthodox leaders in Jerusalem. **Surgeon Describes
Heart Cure Project**

LOS ANGELES, Calif. (CP)—Results of a new experiment in surgical treatment of acute heart attacks were described Friday by Dr. Arthur Vinberg, chief of cardiac surgery at Royal Victoria Hospital in Montreal. In medical terms, the surgery is concerned with acute myocardial infarction—degeneration of the heart muscle into scar tissue because of coronary artery disease with the result that insufficient blood reaches the heart. Dr. Vinberg made it clear that the work of the experiment, carried out on animals, is still to be evaluated. He spoke at a meeting of the American College of Chest Physicians where he also described operations on one of them developed 13 years ago in the desert while water may be flowing a few feet underground beneath him.

The proximity of that blood supply to food-starved area was described by Dr. Vinberg as "one of the strangest paradoxes of nature." He likened it to a man dying of thirst in the desert while water may be flowing a few feet underground beneath him.

KENNEDY ST. IS OPPOSED

SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP) A petition is circulating among residents of First Avenue here, opposing the city's decision to rename the street from Fitzgerald to Kennedy Street.

The decision was reached unanimously at a council meeting Monday night in this city of 65,000 people, 85 miles east of Montreal.

One resident of the street, Sam Boisvert, said he signed the protest because it was the fourth time the name had been changed in the last eight years.

The petitions have been circulated by the Sherbrooke chapter of the St. Jean Baptiste Society, a French-Canadian patriotic organization. A society spokesman said it is felt the city, in naming streets, "should honor figures of whom the city and its merits deserve recognition."

Contract Series Called Dynamite

CALGARY (CP)—The national Social Credit leader, Robert Thompson, said Friday he has placed 14 "critical" questions before the House of Commons asking for the production of documents in connection with a \$30,000,000 heavy water plant planned for Cape Breton.

"This thing is dynamite," he said in an interview. "The company that was awarded the contract, Deuterium of Canada, was allowed to negotiate their own terms because they did not have a complete bid in time.

"At least one of the other three bids was lower at the time the tenders closed and none of the other companies was allowed to re-negotiate their bids after the deadline."

Mr. Thompson said the company that was awarded the contract was formed by an American citizen who gives his address as Winnipeg.

He said the government would do well to take a second look at their decision and allow the "legitimate" Canadian companies to renegotiate their bids.

"If rumors are true," he said, "I am also concerned about the board of directors of the company that is said to be engaged to produce the steam for the plant."

"I would also like to find out more about another company that is supposed to be in the final stages of negotiating the contract."

Final decision on signing of the contracts would be made by the Atomic Energy Board, Mr. Thompson said, and he hoped the board did not say anything until further information was given out.

"At the present time the contracts could not stand up under the scrutiny of the public if they are made up the way the government says they will be," he said.

300 Lay Teachers Strike In Quebec Suburb Schools

QUEBEC (CP)—More than 300 lay teachers stayed away from their classrooms at Ste. Foy Friday over a salary dispute and thousands of pupils at the Quebec suburb's 21 Roman Catholic schools got a holiday that may continue. The teachers' association is demanding parity in salary with teachers in Quebec City. A spokesman said it will be reconvened Monday if the school board does not take any action towards settlement of the situation.
