

Atlantics Score 4-2 Victory Over Glace Bay Miners In Halifax Game

HALIFAX, Jan. 22 — (CP) — Halifax Atlantics downed Glace Bay Miners 4-2 tonight in a lack-lustre Maritime Major Hockey League game before one of the smallest crowds of the season.

It was the League leaders' second victory in as many nights over the cellar-dwelling Miners.

Muckle Hollett sparked Atlantics drive with a pair of goals and an assist to run his total for the two games to six points.

Frank Bergeron shot Halifax in front early in the first period. Glace Bay tied it up at 50 seconds of the middle session on a goal credited to Neil Amadio but actually scored by Atlantics' defenceman Carroll Bloom, who accidentally backhanded the puck past Roy McMeekin in a scramble at the goal-mouth.

Goals by Hollett and Bob Bowness within two minutes regained Atlantics' lead. Eddie Joss wound up Glace Bay's scoring mid-way in the period and Hollett notched his second early in the third.

Don McLaughlin and Bill Burge were the only sinners under the third period, when a pair of duels within two minutes brought minors to Doug McPhee, Lloyd Hinchberger, Billy Watson and Joss.

Atlantics ousted the losers, forcing Don Lockhart to turn aside 33 scoring efforts while Mc-

Meekin handled 25.

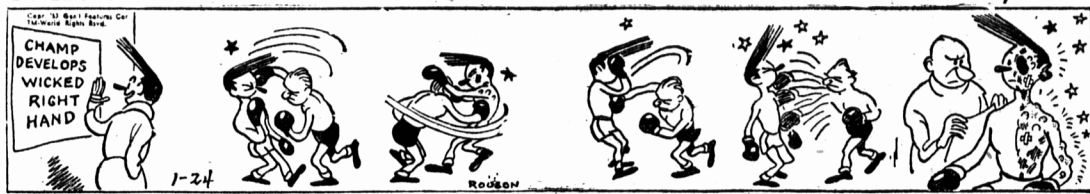

TORONTO, Jan. 22 — (CP) — The \$530 obtained for the signing of a National Hockey League contract formed part of a grabstake which enabled the hockey-playing Marshall Brothers' prospector father to make a \$275,000 iron-ore discovery near Kirkland Lake.

The Toronto Star, in a sports page story today, quotes the father, Charles Marshall, 67, as saying his 55 iron-ore claims in Boston township, eight miles south of Kirkland Lake, have been bought for \$5,600 each by the Dominion Gulf Company, subsidiary of the Gulf Oil Company of the United States.

So far, between \$25,000 and \$30,000 has been paid and another payment is due June 1. The rest of the money is expected as soon as patents are completed.

Canadiens Improve Position With 4-1 Win Over Maple Leafs

MONTREAL, Jan. 22 — (CP) — Montreal Canadiens tonight defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 4-1, their second win in as many nights over the Leafs, and moved to within one point of Detroit Red Wings, current leaders of the National Hockey League.

Maurice (The Rocket) Richard scored twice for Canadiens while Floyd Curry and Elmer Lach banged in the others. Max Bentley tallied for Toronto.

A crowd of 14,426 saw a game that frequently dragged, but broke out with a slugging match in the third period between Montreal's Bert Olin and Toronto's Fern Flaman.

Canadiens showed enough drive to make their passing plays pay off and give Harry Lumley 23 shots to handle. Gerry McNeil, in the Canadiens net, had only 13 stops.

Richard's first goal came early in the opening period when he took Bert Olinstead's passout and drove a 2-foot slap shot past Lumley. Lach counted unassisted in the first minute of the second period when he slapped the puck off George Armstrong's stick and it popped into the net.

Bentley scored eight minutes later when Ron Stewart came in unmoled and passed to Bentley

N. Y. Rangers Defeat Detroit Red Wings 8-2

DETROIT, Jan. 22 — (CP) — New York Rangers, mired deep in the National Hockey League cellar, tonight drubbed the first place Detroit Red Wings 8-2.

Lefty Paul Ronny and Jack Stoddard who contributed two goals each to the winning cause. New York helped the runner-up Montreal Canadiens move to within a point of the Wings, the Habs defeating Toronto 4-1 at Montreal.

Tonight's humiliating defeat was one of the worst ever handed the league leaders on home ice. Trailing 3-2 at the end of the first period, they gave up another goal in the middle session and the blowout before a four-goal final stanza onslaught.

When it was apparent the Rangers were about to win their first game here since January of 1952, the 11,229 fans began hollering for more New York goals. The most goals scored here against the Wings in recent years were nine—by Boston in a 10-9 loss in 1945.

Hockey Ship Contest

The following are the rules governing the Prince Edward Islander Hockey Club "Ship Contest".

1. The winners of the Ship Contest will be those presenting tickets to the President of the Club, which tickets show the nearest time of arrival in Charlottetown Harbour in the spring of 1953 of a ship whose registered tonnage exceeds 300 tons. All Canadian Government boats and Government subsidized boats are excluded from this contest.

2. The winners of the said contest will be those who hold and who present tickets which show the time nearest to that when such ship first passes a location in the Charlottetown Harbour in the spring of 1953, which location will have been selected in advance and which ship must have first notified the Marine Department in Charlottetown of its expected arrival.

3. The contest will be decided by a named Judge who will be selected in advance and whose decision shall be absolute and without appeal.

4. Neither the Judge above mentioned nor any member of his family nor any crew member of the ship in question shall be eligible to participate in the said contest.

5. The holders of the winning tickets must present same to the President of the Prince Edward Islanders Hockey Club within 96 hours of the time of the decisions of the winning tickets; such decisions will be posted in two newspapers in Charlottetown on the day next following the said decisions.

6. If the winning tickets are not presented to the Club President within the time mentioned in Rule 5, the tickets then showing the next nearest time of arrival of the ship will be the winning tickets and must be presented to the Club President within 48 hours of the time limit named in Rule 5.

7. All ticket sales will cease at midnight of April 10, 1953.

8. When the first \$350.00 will have been collected from the sale of the tickets, this amount will be deposited in a Trust Account in a chartered Bank in Canada to be there held in Trust for the payment of the prizes of this contest.

9. The dates listed on the contest tickets have been taken from a 14 year average record of dates of spring arrivals of ships in Charlottetown Harbour. Times and dates on the tickets are of Army designation. Proceeds of this contest are in aid of the Prince Edward Islanders Hockey Club.

Black Hawks In 3-3 Draw With Bruins

BOSTON, Jan. 22 — (AP) — Jerry Couture's second goal of the game tonight enabled Chicago Black Hawks to pull out a 3-3 National Hockey League tie with Boston Bruins.

Coming with less than five minutes of play remaining in the game and while the Bruins were playing short-handed, the visiting marker added another point to Chicago's six-team circuit.

Boston outshot the Hawks by a 43-29 margin but the Bruins were held scoreless until they aimed their 31st try at goalie Al Rollins with only 27 seconds remaining in the second period.

According to Halifax reports Campbell refused to pay the fine because he didn't think he deserved it. If such is the case then Campbell's thinking apparatus needs to be overhauled for no one ever abused a referee much more severely than Campbell until he punched the official and jumped on him. Of course this was not the first time that Campbell molested a referee. He did the same thing last year at Charlottetown and escaped scot-free.

For his refusal to pay the fine Campbell has been suspended indefinitely. He missed last night's game against the Glace Bay Miners within his rights to have the big winner miss tonight's game in Sydney and the game tomorrow against the Islanders. Actually such a three game suspension plus the fine would be about proper punishment for his offence. Since referee Morrow could not see it that way it is probably only hockey justice that Hughie bungled his way into the sentence.

Harry "Kid" Poulton of Charlottetown, who left last week to fight out of Calgary, Alberta, is probably the busiest fighter in the Maritimes during the past decade. Yesterday Will McKluskey of Charlottetown, who makes a hobby of following the ring fortunes of practically every fighter of any time, came up with the information that Poulton has fought 74 professional bouts since he entered the squared circle back in 1942. Harry was then a youngster of 15 and since that time he has developed into one of the best welterweights in eastern Canada.

Poulton has been the winner of an even half a hundred boxing matches. He has won 27 bouts by decision and he has stepped out of the ring twenty-three times after separating his opponent from his senses. Only on three occasions has he been held to a draw and only three times has been knocked out. He has lost 14 fights by a decision and he has fought four exhibition bouts. In an exhibition bout, there are no decisions.

In ten years he has won, lost and regained the welterweight championship of the Maritimes. The 26-year-old Poulton claimed the Maritime crown in September, 1950. He lost the crown in July, 1951 to Tommy "Gun" Spencer of New Glasgow, N. S. This year he regained it from Kid Adshade of Glace Bay, Nova Scotia.

Poulton first laced on the gloves for an Army team in 1942. Although not a member of the Army for he was too young and besides he had a deformed left foot as a result of a battle with polio, he was granted permission to fight for the land service. He had several fights in 1942 and concluded by winning the Maritime Welterweight Inter-Service championship. He suffered one loss and that to Don Logan of New Waterford, N. S. in a four round battle.

He suffered his first knock-out in August of 1945 when Richard "Kid" Howard of Halifax put him out in the seventh round of a memorable fight in Joey MacDonald's Sporting Club. The knock-out was the first of three. Since then he has been downed for the count of 10 by Arnold Pleiger of Chatham in October 1948 and to Sheldon Campbell of Pictou Landing, N.S. in one round in May of 1946. Earlier on the day of the fight Campbell wore a six mile race in his home town. He was only 16 years old at the time. Campbell has long since quit the ring game probably because he burned himself out.

Poulton put a Toronto fighter by the name of "Kid" Sullivan on the deck for a 10 count in 1942 to score his first knock-out. Later that year he knocked out Tiger Burke of Saint John in one round for his

second K.O. victory. The following year he had two knock-outs and the next year 1944 he did not fight. In 1945 he came back to the ring and scored a knock-out over Johnny McCormack of Charlottetown. That year he won four and lost one.

Since then he has kept moving up the ladder. During the last four or five years he has been very successful as he headlined practically every important boxing card in the Maritimes. Boxing activity declining in the Maritimes during the past year, however, so Harry was not very reluctant about accepting an offer to fight in Western Canada. His fight manager in Calgary has several tough scraps lined up for him and if he makes good then Poulton will likely remain in the West until some time next summer.

One of his biggest drawbacks here was that he never had the proper training facilities. There were few around who could teach him anything about the fight game with the result that he entered many of his fights under-trained. Possibly under a fight manager, Poulton will get the ring guidance he needs. Had he received such care several years it is likely that he could have achieved more success. As it is he has done remarkably well for a fellow fighting under a handicap as a result of his bout with polio.

Pesky Miners Back At Forum; Seek Another Friday Night Victory

Murch Chamberlain's Islanders had two objectives tonight when they meet the Glace Bay Miners at the Forum. One is to wipe out the Connie Bonhomme-Jim MacKenzie haul and the other is to break the "Friday Night" jinx which the Miners hold over the Island club.

Strictly speaking the two objectives are almost one and the same. The "Friday Night" jinx commenced when Bonhomme and MacKenzie were traded to the Miners. Since then the two players have played their hearts out to defeat the Islanders on Charlottetown ice.

And the spark they set has developed into quite a fire. The remaining Glace Bay players, fired by the way MacKenzie and Bonhomme play in Charlottetown, turned in top notch efforts with the result that the Islanders-Glace Bay games of late have been crowded.

The Miners tonight should be harder to beat than usual. They will have big Bob Cooper back in uniform. Bob has been out for several weeks as a result of a shoulder injury and re-joined the Maceymen a few days ago.

On top of that the Miners are in bad need of a win. They lost their only two starts this week to Halifax Atlantics and a win on Charlottetown ice would be a healer for those wounds.

The Islanders, on the other hand, are trying to gain ground on the pace-setting Atlantics. They also need the win to stay in the race as well as to atone for their performance against the Glace Bay outfit.

Club officials are hoping that a good crowd of fans will turn out for the game. The attendance at Monday night's game here with Sydney Millionaires was only slightly over 1,200 paid customers and more fans are needed in order to keep the team in operation.

700 Fans See Islanders Play At O'Leary Rink

Last night the O'Leary rink was packed to the rafters when over 700 fans were present to see the Charlottetown Islanders in their first appearance in Prince County since before the present had never before had the opportunity of witnessing the Islanders in action and they were not disappointed as for three periods they put on a thrilling display of their hockey ability. Emmet Francis, regular Forum announcer introduced the players as they came on the ice with their coach, Murch Chamberlain.

For the first period the Islanders played the O'Leary Maroons with the local boys putting up a lively showing against their rugged opponents. The period ended 5-1 for the visitors with O'Leary's star line of Rodgerson, Bagloe and Wedlock scoring their only goal. Charlottetown goals were scored by Clements, Powers, Gordon and Pawlshyn.

For the second period the teams were split up the O'Leary defence and goal tender donning Islanders' sweaters with the Charlottetown defence and goal keeper, Bobbie Mills, playing on the Maroons' team. This was the most exciting session of the game and the teams more evenly matched and both getting three goals. For the Islanders it was Holdaway, Whitlock and Pawlshyn with Rodgerson and Harris (2) for O'Leary. For the final stanza the players reverted to their regular teams and the Islanders opened up with a spectacular display of speed and combination playing to drive in twelve goals, scoring at will, to O'Leary's one tally in the final seconds of the game.
