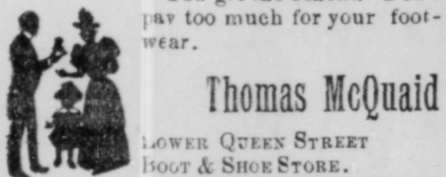

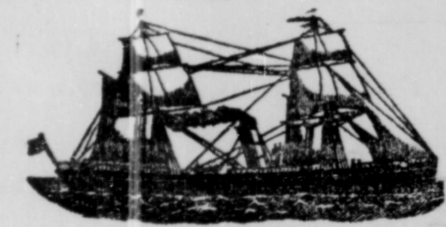

AN EAST POINT PIONEER PASSES AWAY.

In the death of Mr. John Mellick, who died at his home in Elmira, June 23rd, 1899, the eastern part of this Island has lost one of its highly respected pioneer settlers.

Mr. Mellick was born in England in 1810, of German parentage, and came to Halifax, N. S., when only a child, and 73 years ago, at the age of 16 years, he came to P. E. I. The present beautiful settlement of Elmira was at that time nearly all a wilderness, and Mr. Mellick was one of the first to cut through the woods and clear a place for a dwelling. He was a man of undaunted courage, with a firm will and great physical strength, and by his indomitable perseverance and energy he carved out of the forests a comfortable home-land. He married in 1840, a daughter of the late Sampson Rose, Esq., who was of a high English stock. She was a woman of sterling character and noble bearing, and shared with her husband in the struggle for the comfortable home in which they raised their family of seven sons and two daughters. Mrs. Mellick died in 1884, having lived to see all her children occupying useful positions in life.

Last March their eldest son William H. died leaving a widow and seven children. All the other members of the family survive to mourn the loss of a good father. A man who was always willing to sacrifice personal comfort for the good of his family and never slackened in his interest for their welfare.

He was in his usual health until about a week before his death. Although in his 90th year the end came very unexpectedly and the whole neighborhood and a large circle of acquaintances beyond were saddened by the event. One of his sons, Rev. Henry G. Mellick, B. D., formerly superintendent of Baptist Missions for Manitoba and North West Territories now pastor of the Baptist Church in Emerson, Manitoba, was on his way home to visit his father, and had reached Tryon before he heard of his death. In the death of this pioneer a link that bound the past and present generation has been severed.

The leader of the opposition in Manitoba (Hugh John Macdonald) has published a platform of reform and will probably win in the approaching election.

MARITIME MEDICOES

Summary of Proceedings - Officers Elected - Valuable Papers.

At the afternoon session Dr. W. F. Hamilton, of Montreal, read an excellent paper on "Etiology and its Relation to Disease." A capital paper on "Purulent Peritonitis" was also read by Dr. Campbell, of Halifax. Afterwards the members of the Association and a number of friends were entertained at Government House, where good music was discoursed by Galbraith's band and refreshments served.

At the evening session Dr. H. D. Johnson read a paper on "Disturbances of the Menopause." The paper was prepared by Dr. Cushing, of Boston, who deeply regretted his inability to be present and invited the Association to meet in the Hub next year.

Interesting and instructive papers were read by Dr. Morris, of New York, Dr. Bell, of Montreal, and Dr. McLeod, of Charlottetown.

The paper on "Aemias and their treatment," prepared by Dr. Smith, of Halifax, and Dr. Shaw of Charlottetown, was then read. The paper, which was a valuable one, was discussed by Drs. Muir, Conroy, Benson and others.

The paper by Dr. C. D. Murray, of Halifax, and Dr. Boisford, of Moncton, on "Sanatorium treatment of Tuberculosis," was another valuable contribution which was followed by an interesting discussion.

Several papers are set down for reading, at the afternoon and evening sessions.

The proceedings will close with a supper at the Hotel Davies tonight.
