U. S. Steel

CLEVELAND, Dec. 21—(AP)—There's a considerable feeling in the steel industry that the new United States administration will step up the flow of war materials to Korea, Steel magazine reports today.

The weekly metal-working journal says such an increase—in an effort to bring the stalemated Korean war to conclusion—could "unbalance the civilian steel supply even more than it is now."

The demand for some forms of steel, particularly large bars and seamless tubing—both already in tight supply—would be terrific, Steel says.

Unless the military take from the steel output suddenly enlarges, however, there'll be a steadily increasing amount of steel for civilian goods manufacturers through 1953, the magazine said.

The Defence Production Administration has allotted 16.5 per cent more steel for civilian goods in the second quarter of 1953 than it allotted at the start of last quarter, which was just before the steel strike. Not all of the increase in allotment is due to an easing of demand. It is partly because added steelmaking capacity will make more tonnage available by next April 1.

Last week production rose one-half point to 105.5 per cent of rated capacity.

Employment Insurance offices across Canada, in recent years, but certain indispensable records are required by treasury officials, and must be completed every time a weekly claim is paid. Claims payment procedure is standardized from coast to coast and is carried out in accordance with instructions from the head office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission at Ottawa. All offices comply strictly with procedure as laid down, and have little or no leeway in this respect.

Three members of the Charlottetown office staff specialize in the actual payment of claims, but when the claims load is heavy during the winter months, extra staff is engaged to assist them. At present two additional clerks are assisting the claims payment section. People living in Charlottetown, or nearby, are paid in the morning between nine and noon. Every claimant is given a definite time to report for his next payment the following week. By this means it is possible to space the arrival of claimants, to avoid the confusion of having too many people report at the office at the one time. Each claimant's records are so arranged that as he reports for payment his personal documents are immediately available, and there is no delay in giving the public service. Most claimants arrive at the office well before their reporting time and there is usually a line-up of from 25 to 50 people moving forward steadily to receive cheques. In the afternoons the line-up has melted away, but the claims payment section is just as busy as in the morning. They have begun to write and mail benefit warrants and documents, to claimants in the country districts. This involves more paperwork than does the payment of city claimants.

It is expected that because of the "Christmas rush" the local office will work late every evening and, in fact, the office will not close before Wednesday midnight, so long as any claims remain to be paid.

Board Order No. 14 MINIMUM PRICES CONSIGNMENT SALES

PURSUANT to the provision of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Scheme as authorized by the provisions of the Agricultural Products Marketing (Prince Edward Island) Act, the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board hereinafter called the "Potato Board" hereby orders and determines as follows:

(1) Board Order No. 12, passed on the 26th day of November, 1952, is hereby repealed;

(2) From and after midnight of December 18th, 1952, and until further ordered, the minimum price at which table stock potatoes of any variety, may be bought from producers, shall be \$1.85 per 75 lbs. in the inner railway zone, and \$1.80 per 75 lbs. in the outer railway zone;

(3) The above prices shall be the minimum prices to be quoted and paid to producers in respect of bulk graded stock at the producer's farm;

(4) In this Order, the words "inner zone" means the area served by railway shipping points at Charlottetown, Borden and Summerside, and at all railway points between Charlottetown, Borden and Summerside, and the expression "outer zone" means all of the area of Prince Edward Island, other than the inner zone.

Filing Claims

Meantime, in another part of the zone, many people, as many as 50 a day, will be filing claims. These claims are also taken by people who specialize in their type of work. Claims-takers have many problems, and they must be very careful that all required facts in connection with each claim are set down, fully and clearly, so that the adjudicator who later looks the documents over, can arrive at a clear cut decision. After each claim is taken it is passed along to other members of the staff to go through the final process of examination, preparation, and review, and lastly adjudication. Those members of the staff who handle the claim in its final stages are highly trained, and have qualified for their work by passing very stiff examinations within the past two years.

Occasionally there is delay in the payment of a claim, and in the great majority of cases when this occurs, it is due to the fact that the claimant is slow in delivering his Insurance book to the local office. This is something over which the local office has no control, although it does try and help claimants, if failure to produce the Insurance book is traceable to a fault of an employer.

(1) From and after midnight of the 15th day of January, 1953, every producer of table stock potatoes before marketing same, shall write or print or otherwise legibly inscribe his Producer's License number on the tag attached to each container as required by the Dominion Fruit, Vegetable and Honey Act, it being the intent and purpose of this Order that all table stock potatoes being marketed shall be capable of being identified as to the producer of same by means of the Producer's License Number.

Business Reports

SAULT ST. MARIE, Ont., Dec. 21—(CP)—Algoma Steel has increased to \$50,000,000 an original \$40,000,000 expansion program. Sir James Dunn, president, said Friday. Principal item in the \$10,000,000 increase is a battery of 57 coke ovens. Sir James said the new ovens will bring production capacity to 1,340,000 tons a year.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 21—(CP)—MacMillan and Bloedel, Ltd., today reported net profit of \$13,818,340 for the year ended Sept. 30 from gross receipts of \$151,451,970.

The report, covering the first year of operations of the two companies merged Oct. 1, 1951, said comparisons with the previous fiscal year are omitted because "differences in year ends and accounting records and procedures of the merged companies would create misleading impressions."

Earnings per share, after taxes, were \$2.61 leaving dividends per share at 79 cents. Wages, taxes and dividends paid were \$50,305,699.

N. Y. Stocks At New 1952 High

NEW YORK, Dec. 21—(AP)—After struggling through a week of minor barriers, the stock market mustered renewed strength and closed at a 1952 high. The week saw a high degree of selectivity every day with wide swings, both ways and the movement of huge blocks of stock. The railroads maintained their position as market leaders.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks gained 90 cents on the week with most of the gain accounted for by the railroads. The average closed at \$114.80, the highest level since June 4, 1930. On that date it stood at \$116.60.

Allegheny Corp., which owns a majority of Missouri Pacific Common among other railroads holdings, topped the list of 20 most active issues up 3/4 at 5 with 277,000 shares traded.

It was followed by Baltimore & Ohio up 2 3/8 at 27 3/8, Pepsi-Cola up 1/2 at 11, New York Central up 3/8 at 22 1/4, Northern Pacific up 3/8 at 83 5/8, and Pennsylvania Railroad up 7/8 at 22 3/8.

Volume for the week averaged 1,908,000 shares daily. Canadian issues closed the week higher. McIntyre and Hiram Walker both advanced 3/4, Distillers Seagram and International Nicked each added 1/4 and Canadian Pacific gained 5/8. Dome Mines slipped 3/8.

On the curb, Lake Shore and Royalite Oil were both ahead 1/8 and Giant Yellowknife was not quoted.
