Price Of Coal Up

SYDNEY (CP) — Cape Breton
Coal prices were increased a \$1
a ton Wednesday to \$13.10, in keep-
ing with the terms of a new con-
tract between United Mine Work-
ers union and Dosco coal com-
panies.

The increase affects all Dosco
coal users except employees who
continue to get coal at their or-
iginal rate of \$9.71. If a proposed
two-year wage contract is ap-
proved, the miners price will also
be hiked \$1.

The new contract, calling for a
\$2.80 a day wage increase between
Dec. 1, 1956 and Dec. 1, 1957 is to
be voted on Dec. 18.

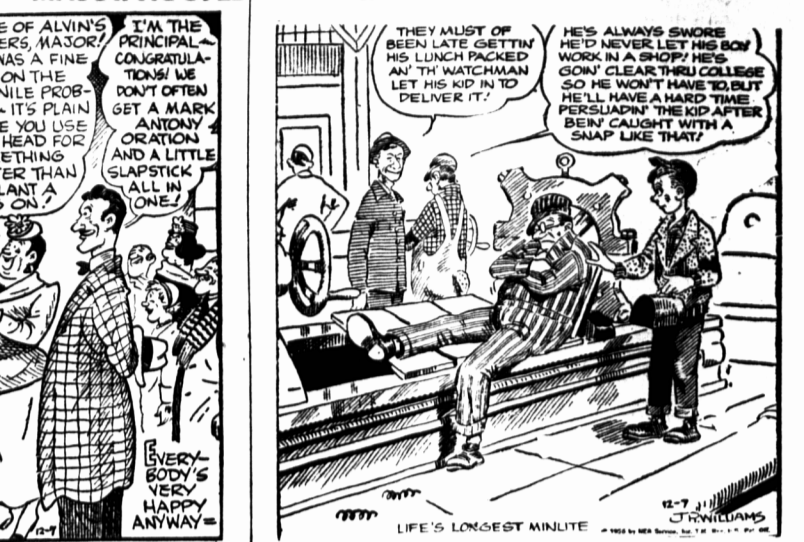

CONTRACT BRIDGE

QUIZ

You are South, both sides vul-
nerable. The bidding has been:

South West North East
1♥ Pass 2♠ Pass
2♥ Pass 3♦ Pass
?

What do you now bid with each
of the following four hands:

1. ♠J2 ♥AKJ78 ♦K98 ♣Q54
2. ♠AJ3 ♥KQJ9742 ♦74 ♣A9
3. ♠A5 ♥QJ8643 ♦K974 ♣AK
4. ♠A8 ♥AK9754 ♦K82 ♣QJ3

1. Four clubs. Both of North's
bids are 100 per cent forcing bids,
each being a new suit named
by the responder. North has
furthermore indicated that his club
suit is of greater length than his
diamond suit because if he had
been of equal length he would have
first responded with diamonds.

Since the heart suit has already
been rebid it cannot be repeated
again with only a five card suit.
Since there is no spade stopper
a three notrump bid is out. By
elimination therefore the four
club preference bid is made in
obedience to the responder's bid
of four hearts. Having already
signed off with the two heart bid,
the jump bid to four hearts can-
not be construed as showing a
very strong hand. It can only
mean that the hearts are virtu-
ally independent of support, but
the rest of the hand cannot amount
to much in view of the previous

minimum rebid.
The high card point count is
only 11, but there are seven prob-
able winning tricks, enough to
undertake a game opposite North's
two forcing bids.

3. Five diamonds. A new com-
plexion has come upon the hand
with North's rebid. The A-K of
clubs and king of diamonds as
well as the diamond support and
single spade, assume vast im-
portance on this bidding sequence
They are right cards.

To bid four diamonds over three
would sound too much to partner
as though it were a bid which
was being made under the com-
pulsion of North's forces. What
we want to do is convey to part-
ner the thought that the raise in
diamonds is being given with gen-
uine enthusiasm, always remem-
bering, however, the previous two
heart signoff bids.

4. Five clubs. Again the im-
pression partner might receive
from a four club bid at this point
must be avoided. North is apt to
particular desire to get to game
and simply a preference for clubs
as against diamonds (See Hand
No. 1).

Such a picture is not an accu-
rate reflection of the true values
held. Not only must a game cer-
tainly be arrived at, but North
must also be alerted to the possi-
bility of a slam.

Hungarian Forestry Students To Continue Studies In B. C.

OTTAWA (CP) — A group of
314 Hungarian forestry students
and professors have accepted an
invitation from the Canadian gov-
ernment to continue their studies
at the University of British Col-
umbia, the immigration depart-
ment announced Wednesday.

The department also said the
students and professors have ac-
cepted an offer of the Powell
River Paper Company to provide
accommodation in one of its B.C.
camps.

The department said the group
of students and professors will
number between 325 and 375. They
will be accompanied by 20 wives
and 50 children of professors.

The invitation to the refugees to
continue their studies at UBC was
extended Tuesday by Immigration
Minister Pickersgill to Dr. Kal-
man Reller, dean of forestry at
Hungary's University of Sopron.
The Powell River Company Mon-
day offered the refugees accom-
modation and the university made
a similar offer.

The department said it hopes
that passage by ship and train
can be arranged in time for the
refugees to arrive in Vancouver
by the middle of January.

An official said it is hoped that
the Hungarians will travel from
the east coast to Vancouver in one
train. However, he was unable to
confirm a Vienna report that the
Canadian government is consider-
ing the possibility of a "Hungarian
freedom" train which would stop
at Canadian universities en route
across Canada.
