

Chualo Meets Nielson Tonight

TORONTO (CP)—George Gainford isn't impressed by the 3-1 odds favoring George Chualo over Bill Nielson in tonight's heavyweight clash at Maple Leaf Gardens.

Chualo, the 27-year-old Canadian heavyweight champion, is the betting favorite over Nielson, 25, of Omaha, Neb., because of his edge in experience and the calibre of opponents he has faced.

"Don't let the odds fool you," said Gainford, who arrived in Toronto to help promote the 10-round bout.

"This boy is a very good boxer and if the Chualo camp takes him too lightly they'll be sorry come Monday night."

Gainford is manager of five-time middle-weight champion and former welterweight king Sugar Ray Robinson.

Chualo signed to meet Nielson shortly after he lost a 12-round unanimous decision to Patterson.

Patterson was scheduled to arrive here Sunday night to confer with the Chualo camp about a rematch. The word is he will sign with the winner of tonight's bout for a fight sometime in June.

PROMISE MADE

"Chualo will knock him out next time," said Gainford. "I was at the first fight and I can't understand how they arrived at that decision. Chualo should have won on aggressiveness and more punches."

"But first George has to get over this guy Nielson," he added.

CONCERNED ABOUT HIM

But Irving Ungerman, Chualo's manager, says he is very much concerned with the 200-pound six-foot two-inch Nielson, who looks more like a Hollywood glamor boy than a professional boxer.

"I knew this boy was a good one when we signed for him," said Ungerman, a Toronto businessman.

Royals Down Shearwater; Whitlock Fires 'Hat Trick'

Sandy's Royals paced by the three goal performance of Gordie Whitlock downed Shearwater Flyers, Nova Scotia provincial champions, 9-4 in the first game of their best-of-three series for the Maritime Intermediate 'A' hockey championship at the Shearwater rink Saturday night.

The game was a rough and tumble affair with the Royals' "hat trick" of Dave Lawlor, Stan Pearson and Gord Whitlock being the biggest factor in the Royals win as their unit carried the play to the Nova Scotia pucksters throughout the contest and proved to have too much skating ability and desire for the host team, according to playing coach Angus "Angie" Carroll when this writer spoke to him last night.

The Carroll coached forces invaded the Shearwater "ice palace" with two forward lines and three defencemen. Angus played between brother Dick Carroll and Alan (Smelt) Gillis to form one attacking unit while Lawlor, Pearson and Whitlock rounded out the forward forces. Mulligan was unable to make the trip to Shearwater due to an illness in the family.

NEW YORK (CP) — Flag Raiser, a colt owned by Isidor Bieber, tossed an unexpected road-block in Bold Lad's path to the Kentucky Derby Saturday when he won the \$91,300 Wood Memorial at Aqueduct here.

Going to the front soon after the start of the 1 1/4-mile race, Flag Raiser opened up as much as four lengths over Bold Lad, the odds-on favorite from the Wheatley Stable, and held on in a furious homestretch drive for a neck decision over the fast-closing Hail To All, carrying the silks of Mrs. Ben Cohen.

Bold Lad, who looked as if he was ready to take the lead one-eighth of a mile from home, did not have enough to stave off Hail To All's great finish and raised up third.

Flag Raiser was timed in 1:50 1/5 under Bob Ussery. Flag Raiser ran coupled in the betting with Isle of Greece and Turn to Reason. The three-year-old trained by Hirsch Jacobs paid \$17.00, \$6.60 and \$2.40 to his backers in the crowd of 55,189.

Perfect Sky, ridden by Eddie Burns and carrying 114 pounds, raced the 1 1/4-mile over a track fast in one minute, 48 2/5 seconds.

He won by one and one-fourth lengths over Terry's Secret, with Nasharco another three-quarter length back.

The gelding's first stakes victory was worth \$39,900, nearly three times his previous lifetime earnings of \$13,747.

Perfect Sky raced in a three-horse entry trained by Charles Whittingham and returned \$22.20, \$7.60 and \$4.20. Terry's Secret, ridden by Alex Maclean, returned \$8.60 and \$4.80, with Nasharco paying \$3.40 for the show in this richest of all California derbies.
