Meeting her, you never would have known she was ill. She has one manifestation is that she cannot bear to be handled. She had a state home. Others have to go to the store for her and do similar chores that most of us do for ourselves.

Do you or your readers know of a place that might offer some chance of recovery for her? She loves to work and keeps a spotless house and in this way could offset part of the expense. The balance of moderate, could be handled by her.
