FATAL ACCIDENT AT RUSTICO.

The Accidental upsetting of a Lamp Causes The Death of Two Children.

A SAD ACCIDENT occurred at the residence of Mr. Joseph Peters, South Rustico, on Saturday night. It seems that in some way, probably by the pulling of the table cloth, a lamp on the table was accidentally upset by the children, and three of the little ones were so badly burned that two have since died—one last night and the other this morning. The other child, the youngest of the family, will recover. The names of the children who died were Adolphe and Josephine, the former being three years of age and the latter five. The fire was extinguished before the house was very much damaged, but not in time to prevent the results above stated. Mr. Peters was not at home when the unfortunate accident occurred. Mrs. Peters and the servant girl were the only occupants of the house, except the children. Dr. Gallant was called in and did all that lay in his power for the little sufferer. Mr. and Mrs. Peters have the sympathy of all in the calamity that has overtaken them.

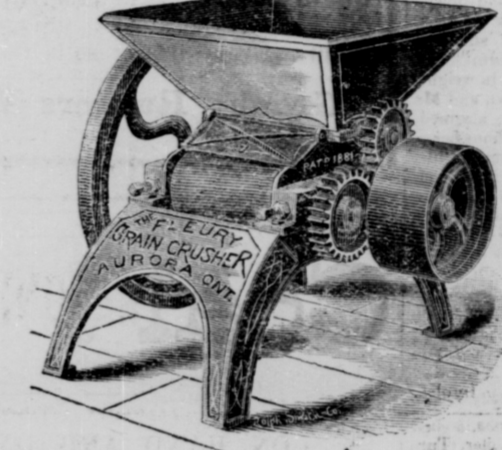
