REX ALLEN STARS AT THE CAPITOL

Rex Allen, Republic's popular young Arizona cowboy, gives the customers their money's worth in suspenseful action, hard riding and shooting and an unusually novel story line in Republic's new western thriller, "Utah Wagon Train", which opens to a packed house of action fans at the Capitol today.

The fast-rising cowboy star and his miracle horse, Koko, will win a host of new friends in this smooth, fast-paced story of buried pioneer gold which cropped up to start the feudin' and the fightin' all over again years later. Lovely Penny Edwards, appearing opposite Rex, provides a refreshing and impressive addition in the feminine lead, balanced by the hilarious antics of comic Buddy Ebsen who is now a welcome trademark in the Rex Allen series.

The well plotted story opens when Rex receives a frantic call for help from his uncle in Sonora, Utah. He believes his life has been endangered through acceptance of the job of trail boss for a modern cross-country wagon trek. The uncle's premonitions are all too real for he is killed before Rex can arrive.

It is from pretty Nancy Bonner, portrayed by Penny Edwards, that Rex learns of a half million dollars worth of buried gold hidden in a cave by the original party years ago. Her father awaits the wagon train with a map of the cave handed down from the only survivor.

It's a nip and tuck battle with the renegades to get the wagon train through and the suspense mounts with every rise of the western plain or mountain crag, leading to the precipitous climax. Director Phil Ford has exercised a deft touch in developing high paced action and romantic feeling in "Utah Wagon Train".

Canadian Dollar

MONTREAL, Sept. 25 — (CP) — The United States dollar today closed at a discount of 4 1/32 per cent in terms of Canadian funds, up 1/32 from Wednesday's close. That is, it took 95 31/32 cents Canadian to buy \$1 American. The pound sterling was \$2.67 1/4, up 1/16 from Wednesday.

Preparing For South Shore Music Festival

Preparations are now under way for the fifth annual South Shore Musical Festival which will be held in the Summerside High School auditorium on November 7th and 8th. According to all indications this year's festival will be larger than previous years.

The first South Shore Musical Festival was held in the Summerside High School auditorium, in November 1948. At that time only thirteen classes were included in the competition, and these were divided into two sessions. The registration was so large that the following year the festival was expanded to three sessions, and offered twenty-two classes. The 1951 festival offered thirty-five classes, and, for the first time, included folk dancing classes in the programme.

Each year the number of entries has increased until the executive felt compelled to take definite action to deal with the problem of lack of time. After much thought, they brought forward suggestions for the following changes, which they hope will solve their problems. There will be three important innovations in this fall's festival programme.

In the first place, the festival will be expanded to five sessions, that is sessions will be held on Friday afternoon and evening as well as on Saturday; secondly, there will be classes in the competition for groups and individual competitors from schools of over five rooms; and, in the third place, preliminary competitions will be held for all individual classes where the registration numbers more than six contestants, excepting classes for children ten years of age and under. This last mentioned change will make the programme much more interesting to the audience, as there will be six competitors only called to the stage, in the final competition, from each of the piano solo, the vocal solo, and the elocution classes. There will be no preliminary

competition for the Saturday morning sessions, as it will be given over to the classes for young children. The Saturday evening sessions should be most interesting, as the programme for that evening will feature the classes open to competitors from both rural areas and the larger communities. These classes consist of the competitions for young people, the folk dancing classes, and finally the adult choral groups. S.
